MOYER

HAYWOOD - PETTIBONE

(Continued from page one.)

While it was true that Adams was immediately rearrested on the charge of killing Fred Tyler in north Idaho, and for which he was given a speedy trial, yet as a witness for the state he is lost forever.

Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, who had been implicated by Orchard's confession as the instigators of the Steunenberg murder, were arrested at night in Denver upon requisition of the governor of Colorado and hurried on a special train to Boise. The three men were charged with being accomplices of Orchard, and under the statutes of Idaho an accomplice is held equally guilty with the principal and if convicted may receive the same punishment. It was this point that stirred up so much antagonism to the action of the Idaho authorities, as they later were forced to charge the men with the actual commission of the crime, when it was known that neither of them had been in the state for months, for if Orchard's confession be true, then under the Idaho law they are in fact equally guilty with Orchard.

No sooner had the Federation officials been lodged in the Idaho penitentiary for safe keeping than Federation attorneys from Denver and Spokane started for Boise. On arriving here they sought to release the prisoners by invoking the aid of the writ of habeas corpus. They filed the first application in the district court, where, after argument the writ was denied. An appeal was then taken to the state supreme court of the United States. About this time application was made for the writ in the United States district court in Boise before Judge Beatty. After a hearing Judge Beatty denied the writ, and an appeal was taken to the supreme court of the United States, making two appeals pending before the court of last resort.

Finally the court handed down an opinion sustaining the decision of the Idaho courts in holding the prisoners to answer to the charges and stand trial in this state.

Although that decision was rendered last fall, the mandate did not arrive until the middle of March.

For the last six months, Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone have been confined in the county jail at Boise. They were allowed to take exercise on the court house lawn several times each day, are in apparent perfect health and look much heavier than when they were brought here from Colorado.

Orchard was kept in close confinement at his own request. He was said to be afraid of dynamiters, and at his own request he was never taken out unless accompanied by three or four guards. While Orchard's confession is considered the chief testimony against the prisoners, it is said that cipher letters and telegrams from them found in Orchard's trunk in the Caldwell depot a few days after his arrest may be of even more importance than the testimony of Orchard himself.

Sinking Fund Buying Bonds. Strong Combine Formed.

New York, March 28.—A new and what promises to be an important development, in the dry goods jobbing business has come to the front in the formation of the Empire Dry Goods company, along lines suggested, more or less remotely, by the Clafin company and its string of allied stores. This company is primarily a combination and the outgrowth of opportunities and needs that appealed especially to several of the larger stores for retail located in Boston, Buffalo, Rochester and Akron, Ohio.

Five prominent dry goods houses are represented in the new company. Mr. P. A. O'Connell, of the James A. Houston Co., of Boston, is president, and the members concerned feel that it is a specially good selection and presages success. The company has already begun business with completely equipped and well-stocked sale rooms, and it is said, will act, more or less, as a clearing house for the business houses already named. Everything betokens an early entrance upon a business of great activity.

The nominal capital is no index of the volume of transactions expected, an d will be limited at present to \$20,000. By the plans upon which the business is based it is believed to be ample for its present purposes.
