OBERVE FEAST OF PASSOVER

Hebraic Festival Begins Friday Evening and Continues One Week

Members of the Jewish race in Salem and all over the world will observe the Hebrew feast of the Passover, which begins tomorrow evening and continues for one week. The feast is in commemoration of the escape of the Israelites out of Egypt. There will be no services in the synagogues, but the synagogues in Portland will hold special services for some of the Jewish people from Salem.

The "Passover Feast" takes its name from Biblical history, when the Israelites "passed over" the houses of the Egyptians, which were marked with the blood of the paschal lamb. It is celebrated from the sun setting on the 14th of the Jewish month, Nisan, until sunset of the 21st of the month, during which period the Israelites were permitted to eat only unleavened bread. Hence the feast is known as the "feast of unleavened bread."

The association of the feast with the exodus from Egypt is still strongly maintained, but the ceremony has gradually developed until the present form has practically disappeared. Originally the two feasts, the Passover and the Feast of Unleavened Bread, were distinct.

tinently separate, according to such authorities; the first being the feast of unleavened bread, the food of the ancient Hebrews in harvest time, when they were too busy to await the slow process of leavening their food; the second feast was a festival in which the chief rite was the sacrifice of a sheep within the family circle and the sprinkling of the doorposts of the house with blood. Of the two feasts, the first, called mosach, is the old Canaanitish harvest festival, commemorative of the ripening of the corn, which the Hebrews adopted upon taking possession of the Canaanitish soil. Through thanksgiving gifts and sacrifices, this festival developed into an occasion for dances and mirth, with a sacrificial meal.

The second feast, called pesach, has no connection with agriculture, and was originally, it is declared, a rite of propitiation or lustration observed during a pestilence or some other special occasion. It consisted in sprinkling with blood the entrance or tent which was held sacred. It is still customary with some descendants of the Israelites, to sprinkle their camels and flocks with blood during the ravages of a pestilence. This custom, from being originally indulged in on extraordinary occasions, became a regular practice of the springtime, the bearing time of the flock, as a special protection to the lambs, and developed naturally into an occasion of rejoicing.

The combinations of these two feasts and the development of the double festival, gradually assumed the form of the Jewish Passover festival, which is now celebrated upon the original dates, which correspond, in the Gregorian calendar, to the seven days between sunset of March 30, and sunset of April 6.

Railroads Entitled to a Hearing.

(From the Washington Post, March 8, 1907.)

The statements made by E. H. Harriman to members of the press during his stay in Washington were very interesting, and did much to remove popular prejudice against him and the interests he represent: * * *

Mr. Harriman and other great railroad men are entitled to a hearing. They can throw a light upon the paramount questions of the day that will assist powerfully in forming public sentiment. They have failed to avail themselves of the right to do their share in molding public opinion, leaving the task to muck-rakers, thoughtless agitators and demagogues, as well as to public-spirited and clear thinkers, like President Roosevelt, who preserve the value of public opinion in bringing about needed reforms. If there is ignorance and prejudice in the solidifying sentiment in favor of national control of corporations, the fault does not lie altogether in the muck-rakers who have stirred up such agencies of evil. The corporation men themselves are partly at fault in permitting the growth of prejudice without taking the proper steps to prevent it.

If the railroads of the country are a part of the people themselves, dependent upon the good will of the public and honestly trying to do their share in building up the country, ready to co-operate with the lawmaking power in the enactment and enforcement of legislation that will give everybody a square deal, frankness and candor will make the fact known. The public does not want more than a square deal. Its resentment is not aroused because the railroads make money. It is easily made resentful, however, against men who shun the light. Muck-rakers find it easy to convince the public that men who evade public discussion of their acts do so because their ways are dark. A single evasion of a proper question may be skillfully twisted

Carnegie Guest of Telegraph Corps.

New York, March 28.—Andrew Carnegie is one of the guests tonight at the reunion and dinner at the Manhattan hotel of the United States military telegraph corps. It was at Carnegie's suggestion that, at the outbreak of the Civil war that four operators were sent from the Pennsylvania lines to Washington, and the corps, from this small beginning, was enlarged to about 1200 men.

David H. Bates, one of the original four, suggested this special reunion and dinner. He and Albert Chandler and Charles A. Tinker were cipher operators in the war department, and none, it is said, were closer than they in confidential relations to President Lincoln. They were known as the "Sacred Three."

The corps now numbers less than 200, about 60 of whom promised to be present at the dinner tonight. Twenty sons of members have also promised to attend. The other guests will be the commanders of the corps, General Thomas T. Eckert, Colonel R. C. Clowry, and William R. Plum, historian of the corps, and like Mr. Carnegie, an honorary member.
