### In the New York Theaters.

Oscar Hammerstein has secured Mme. Lillian Nordica, the dramatic soprano, for the next season at the Manhattan opera house. Mme. Nordica has been engaged for the entire season, and will sing Italian, French and German roles. It is said Mr. Hammerstein is seriously considering the production of "Tristan and Isolde," and "The Ring of the Nibelung" for next season with Mme. Nordica in her well known roles of Isolde and Brunnhilde. There are now three world famous prima donnas on the Manhattan list for next season, Mme. Nellie Melba, Mme. Lillian Nordica and Mary Garden, the American singer from the Opera Comique.

The Ben Great Players presented at the Garden theater "As You Like It" under modern conditions, presenting the comedy with scenery. This was followed by a revival of "Julius Caesar" in olden style. Next week "Everyman" will be revived.

William Morris is the producer and chief actor in "The Holy City," a play in blank verse, which Thomas William Broadhurst has built around the story of Mary Magdalene and which had its first New York production at the Lincoln Square theater. Its five acts are laid in scenes familiar in the story of Christ's life, and one of them depicts the trial of Barabbas before Pontius Pilate. The last act is in the garden of Joseph of Arimathea on the morning of the Resurrection, and the curtain falls on the singing of the first eastern hymn.

"The Mills of the Gods" has apparently settled down for a run at the Astor theater. Wagenhals & Kemper have about decided to postpone their production of "The Ambitious Mrs. Olcott" which was scheduled for early in April.

"The Great Divide" has completed its 21st week in the Princess theater and seats are on sale up to and including May 1. Miss Anglin and Mr. Miller will have to withdraw the drama at that time unless another Broadway theater can be secured, as the lease on the Princess expires at the end of April.

Miss Eleanor Robson continues in the greatest success of her New York season, "Salome Jane" at the Liberty theater.

"The Man of the Hour" the Board-hurst political play, continues at the Savoy.

Frank Daniel's burlesque of "The Seven Vells" dance from "Salome" is one of the amusing features of "The Tattooed Man" at the Criterion.

At the Knickerbocker "The Red Mill" is likely to run well into the summer.

The excellent performance given by Herbert Keiley, Effie Shannon, William Hawtre, Ferdinand Gottschalk and Henry Kolker to Bernard Shaw's comedy "Widowers' Houses" at the Herald Square at the special matinees on Mondays, Tuesday, Thursdays and Fridays are attracting increased attendance.

Sir Edward Elgar, the distinguished English composer, made his first New York appearance Tuesday evening at Carnegie hall, when he conducted the Oratorio society's performance of "The Apostles." On Tuesday evening next he will direct the first American production of his latest choral work "The Kingdom." This is a continuation of "The Apostles" which made a deep impression here two years ago.

Tony Proctor will celebrate during the week the completion of his 42nd year as a manager in New York city, and yesterday inaugurated the 43rd year of his popular entertainment. An appropriate celebration was held.

"Pioneer Days," and "Neptunes Daughter," at the Hippodrome, are rapidly approaching their 200th performance. The popularity of this stupendous show has been greatly increased the last few weeks by the remarkable circuit features which have been introduced in the arena.

The act of the 24 Arabs, who enter with camels and a desert caravan, is a sensational acrobatic exhibition. A remarkable feat of amphibious accomplishments is exemplified in the spectacle of a sea lion riding on horseback and at the same time balancing a ball on the tip of its nose. The skill exhibited by this animal arouses wonder and amazement at every performance. The other big circus acts continue to please, while the mystery of the disappearance of the mermaids in the tank scene of "Neptunes Daughter" continues to be as great as ever.

### Aims to Enter Milwaukee.

Milwaukee, Wis., March 29.—It is rumored that the Illinois, Iowa & Minnesota is now negotiating for the entrance to Milwaukee over the Milwaukee Southern.

This road is in operation between Aurora and Rockford, Ill., as a belt line connecting several western and southern railroads. From Aurora it runs southwest over the tracks of the Elgin, Joliet & Eastern to Joliet, whence it proceeds to Mokena, Ill., over its own tracks. It is a Wisconsin corporation organized to build the Wisconsin part of a railroad between Rockford and Milwaukee, by way of Detroit and Janesville.

The Illinois, Indiana & Gary is designed to complete the service about Chicago into Gary, the steel corporation homestead.

The company is also rebuilding the bridge over Elk creek, which was washed away two months ago on the line of the Drain-Coos Bay road.

Mrs. Brunk and children left Ashland last week and will take up their home in Salem. Major L. D. Kinney, of Coos Bay, has sold to F. B. Waite three fine horses. Mr. Waite will take them to Portland for the use of himself and family. They are as fine horses as there is in the state, one being a prize animal. The price paid was \$1000 for the three.

## HEALTH OFFICER

### Trade Outlook Encouraging.

London, March 29.—The course of events has amply confirmed the reports of the past few weeks as to the strengthening of markets throughout the continent, and while spot supplies have been freely taken by spinners and combers, the future market has responded to the general movement by sharp upward turns. It is undeniable that, so far from slackening—as was thought at one time—the textile department of continental trade has made distinct progress during the current year, and the outlook may be called entirely encouraging without any exception or qualification apart from the too ready participation of the speculative element pure and simple. The main factor of the week has been in Belgium, the plate wool sale at Antwerp, which resulted in practically the bulk of the offerings, 6000 bales, being sold, either at full auction values, or at a shade below, relatively low, especially as the arrivals are already engaged for direct transit.
