FULTON VERSUS PINCHOT

Department of Agriculture Takes a Hand in Controversy

The following matter is sent to the Capital Journal by the government:

The following letter has been sent to the secretary of agriculture to the effect of the Blue Mountain American, Sumpter, Ore.:

March 14, 1907.

Editor, The Blue Mountain American, Sumpter, Ore.

Dear Sir:—My attention has been called to a letter from Senator Fulton to J. D. Combs, dated February 15, and to your editorial comment upon it. The regulations forbidding grazing without a permit on national forests were made under the authority of the act of June 4, 1897 (30 Stat., 34-36), which reads as follows:

"The secretary * * * may make such rules and regulations as will be necessary for the objects of such reservation, namely, to regulate their occupancy and use and to preserve the same from destruction; and any violation of the provisions of this act or such rules and regulations shall be punished as is provided in the act of June 4, 1888, relating to section 5388 of the Revised Statutes of the United States."

I have no desire to do anything in this matter other than the duty imposed upon me by congress and my official oath. I have acted throughout in accordance with the advice of the attorney-general, as I was bound to do, and will continue to do so. I am sensible of the wisdom and moderation of your editorial comment upon this matter, and I thank you for the public service you have rendered in making it.

The letter from Senator Fulton referred to by the secretary and printed in the Blue Mountain American was as follows:

Washington, D. C. Feb. 4, '07.

Mr. J. D. Combs, John Day, Ore.
My Dear Mr. Combs:—I have your letter of the 25th ultimo. As you probably are aware, have been opposed to the management of the forest reserves in the manner it is being conducted and have tried to get some backing from the stock organizations; but every time Mr. Pin-

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chot goes out and meets the stock growers they seem to endorse his plans. Now, had there been the right sort of a campaign made by the stockmen against charging for pasture in the forest reserves, that policy would have been defeated.

I went out against it at once, but could not get the stockmen to back me up. However, it may be that this policy serves their interest the best.

Now, as far as the forestry officials not permitting you to turn your stock out or to enter upon the forest reserves before June or any other time is concerned, that is all nonsense. There is no law against turning stock on reserves at any time. The only thing they could do would be to drive them off.

If I were living right adjacent to a reserve, I should not hesitate to turn my cattle out at any time and let them go on the reserve; and if they should go on the reserve, it would be no offense against the law. In other words, there is no law making it a crime for cattle to be turned out in the vicinity of, or indeed to be driven upon, a forest reserve.

If any official tells you that he will have you arrested if your stock is turned out or goes upon the reserves, I wish you would give me his name and position. He is simply telling you a falsehood and probably knows it. You tell the people that they need have no fear at all about turning their stock out; that there is no law against it, even though the stock do go upon the reserves. Of course the forest rangers can drive the stock off the reserve, but that is all they can do. They are not to arrest the stock, impound them, or charge the owner anything because of their being on the reserve. All they can do is to drive them off.

The Blue Mountain American commented editorially upon Senator Fulton's letter as follows:

Fulton's Advice.

Elsewhere in this issue is printed a letter from Senator Fulton to Joe Combs, a well known stockman of the John Day country. It is certainly a remarkable communication, and, as it has been forwarded to the forest-reserve chiefs at Washington, an adjustment must be forthcoming within a few weeks or the condition will be somewhat chaotic, if not anarchic, within the borders of not only the Blue Mountain reserve, but all other reserves in Oregon, where Fulton, by reason of his position, stands for something. That he has made a serious mistake in advising Combs and others that they can range their stock at will and without compliance with the regulations and requirements of the service will hardly admit of question. That these regulations and restrictions are based upon the law which created the reserves and has prepared for their policing through a service of rangers is pretty well understood. Because Senator Fulton, like a good many others, opposed the enactment of that measure is no reason why it should not be complied with at this time.

Pinchot evidently understands his position pretty thoroughly as chief of the departmental division in control, and in springing his advice to Combs et al., to do as they please and take the chance of merely having their stock driven off by constituted authorities Senator Fulton is going up against a bunch of trouble both out here and in Washington that will hurt him to an immeasurable degree.

We will await Pinchot's response to the senator's position with considerable interest as the time for reserve ranging approaches.

Butte Operators Uneasy.

Mt. Union, March 29.—Despite the agreement reached last week between the copper mining companies in the Butte district and the committees representing their employees, the management of the larger companies do not feel that all chance of another slip-up in the negotiations is past. It is learned that the miners' union will have to change some requirements of its constitution before finally ratifying the agreement. A meeting for this purpose is in session today. In the meantime further delay is feared. Further details as to the agreement have been disclosed.

The agreement provides that wages shall be \$4 a day when copper is 18 cents a pound or more, and \$3.50 a day when it is less. An agreement between the smelter men and the companies is now being considered.

ENLARGE SALEM PLANT.

The Portland General Announces Changes to Cost \$20,000.

A Portland special says: Manager R. K. Page, of the Portland General Electric company's interests here, announced tonight that as a result of the meeting here yesterday, attended by General Manager Sykes and W. S. Dole, of the firm of Dole & Co., consulting engineers, the Salem gas plant will be entirely remodeled. It will be converted into an oil-burning plant, and about \$20,000 will be expended.

Mr. Page says that the company has appropriated \$50,000 for extension work on the various lines and other interests between Salem and Portland. The first year's expenditures on the gas plant will be followed next year by \$10,000. The present capacity of the plant is 50,000 cubic feet, which will be doubled.

Manager Page says that since the company acquired the plant one year ago the reduction in the cost of gas has been about 30 per cent. Besides the improvement in the gas plant, the company will spend \$5000 as their share of the now paving on State street and \$10,000 for new machinery for the power plant.
