tion of the public land reopened to entry by the President's order of March 12th. These lands, previous to the order, were classed as coal lands and had been withdrawn. Montana leads the list in the number of acres opened for entry, the total being 2,100,000. New Mexico comes next with 2,000,000; Colorado has 1,250,000; Wyoming, 1,200,000; Oregon, 710,000; Washington, 320,000; and Utah, 135,000.

Charles D. Walcott has retired as director of the bureau of the geological survey amid a storm of anathema and anguished wails of the clerks of the bureau. Mr. Walcott is to take the secretaryship of the Smithsonian Institution, but he does not carry the best wishes of his

former associates, although it is probable he was unable to prevent the unfortunate occurrence that clouded his departure. Some days ago, when his resignation was officially announced Mr. Walcott was presented with a magnificent silver loving cup by his clerks, the presentation being made at a banquet which was given in his honor. Many speeches of good will and felicitation were made by various members of the geological survey and Mr. Walcott went home hugging to his bosom the silver trophy. The next morning when the clerks gathered for their daily labors each found upon his desk a typewritten letter announcing that his salary had been cut from 20 to 25 per cent. The announcement was signed by Mr. Walcott and was his last official act as director of the survey. Practically every employe of the bureau was reduced, men receiving \$1400 a year being put in the \$1000 class and more

than \$600 being knocked off the pay of the chief clerk. The explanation given was that congress had failed to provide sufficient funds to defray the expenses of the bureau.

According to a monograph issued by the bureau of statistics of the department of commerce and labor, the United States now ranks third among the world's exporters of manufactures. The report shows that not only do the exports of manufactures now exceed \$700,000,000 a year, but they have doubled in value in a single decade. In the comparative tables it is shown that in 1880 manufactures formed only 15 per cent of the total exports of domestic products, while last year they were 40 per cent of the whole.

Capital and Labor.

A good audience greeted the Empire Stock Co., in their production of "Capital and Labor" at the Klunger-Grand last night. Act 4 opens with the strike still unsettled. The men have grown desperate at the factory and just as matters look their worst, Margaret comes to the aid of the strikers and induces her father to concede to their wants. A pretty love affair between Margaret and Mr. Weston, the superintendent of the factory winds up the play which was thoroughly interesting throughout.
