He is wanted in connection with financial operations under different names at Victoria, Portland and Oregon City.

Russ was admitted to citizenship on oath and testimony of J. M. Cutsforth and Adams.

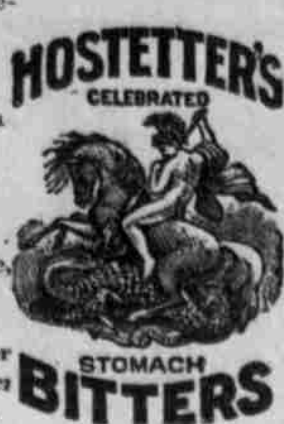
De Vries was admitted to citizenship on oath and testimony of J. M. Cutsforth and Adams.

Iola, Kansas—John Tolson fired five shots into the body of his wife here today and fought his way through an angry crowd. A posse later captured him. Jealousy was the cause of his crime.

Ft. Worth, Texas—A collision of freight trains occurred six miles south of here this morning. It is reported six men are killed, and 30 cars burned.

Chicago—F. A. Holbrook this morning in the federal court pleaded guilty of conspiracy in restraint of trade. Sentence is deferred. Holbrook was indicted after investigation of the furniture trust.

Chicago—Knapp and Neill met the managers of the railroads this morning, and will meet the men this afternoon. It is said the men have waived some minor demands and it is expected the managers will yield on the others. Ultimate settlement is thought likely.

Constantinople—A severe earthquake accompanied by heavy loss of life is reported at Bitlis.
