Aged Man of North Salem Has Gone Without Food For Thirty-seven Days

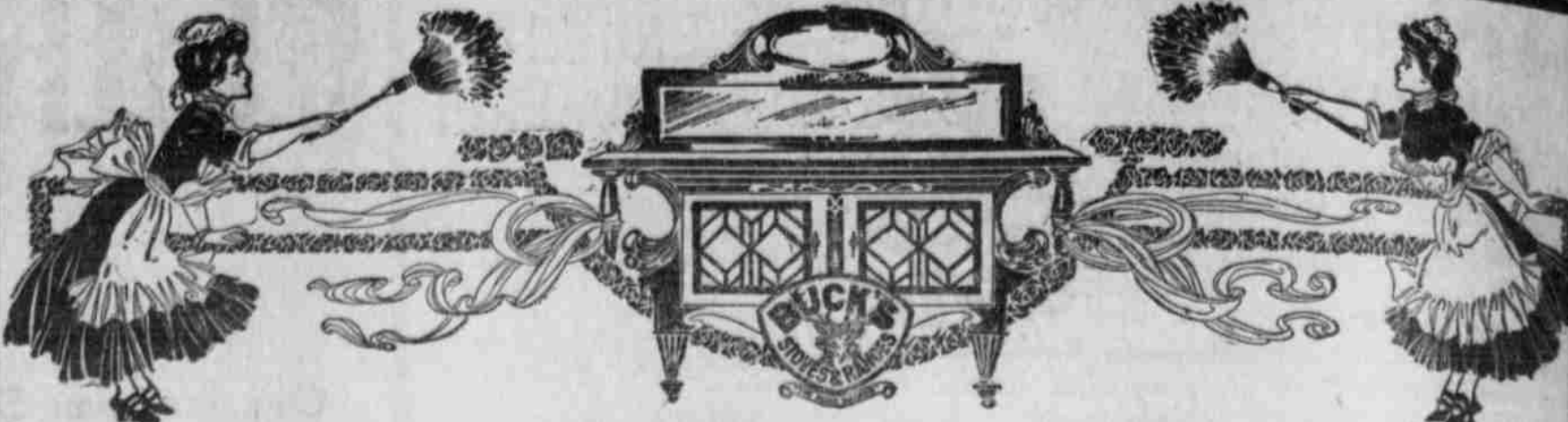

Seattle Track Meet.

The indoor track meet at the Coliseum, under the auspices of the Seattle Athletic Club was the greatest success in the history of Oregon. The center of attraction was Dan Kelly, of Oregon, the holder of the world's record for the 50 and 100-yard dash. Kelly equaled the world's indoor record for 50 yards, 0:05 2-5.

Holdman, a University of Washington freshman, set a new mark for the pole-vault for the coast at 11 feet, 3 1/4 inches. S. A. C. won the meet with a score of 37 1/2 points; U. of O., 35 1/2, was second.
