The excursion party will arrive in Baker City, Tuesday, May 7th, and go on to Boise.

The trip will be perhaps the most notable one ever made by a party of Portland business men. The object is for the awakening of a renewed interest in the state trade relationships and extending personal acquaintances that reach all over the eastern part of the state and into Idaho.

The date of the arrival of the excursionists from Salem and Portland is looked forward to with pleasure, and great preparations are being made in the way of receptions.

Just as talented orators, just as keen business men, lawyers and politicians reside at Salem as at Portland and this can be demonstrated on the coming excursion to Eastern Oregon.

Some Racing News.

J. Pierpont Morgan stopped over on his way to London to see the great national steeple chase.

Ervon won the 3000 sovereigns grand national handicap.

It was officially announced last week that races will be held at the running track at Lexington, Ky., from April 27 to May 4. These dates have been allotted by the Kentucky Racing commission.

The fall meeting of the Montreal Jockey club will begin on the 5th of September, and continue until September 14. This will fill the gap between the closing at Saratoga and the opening of the fall meeting at Toronto.

Sixty-one thoroughbreds have been allotted weights for Excelsior handicap, which is the opening stake at the Jamaica track, to be run on April 26. Go Between, the Suburban winner, has been given the top impost of 126 pounds.

The most important racing fixtures in Europe will be run on the following dates: Liverpool Grand National this week; Great Metropolitan, April 26; Two Thousand Guineas, May 1; One Thousand Guineas, May 3; Chester Cup, May 8; Kempton Park Great Jubilee, May 11; Manchester Cup, May 24; Epsom Derby, June 5; The Oaks, June 7; Grand Prix Paris, June 16; Liverpool Cup, July 30; Goodwood Cup, August 1; St. Ledger, September 13; Jockey Club Stakes, October 16; Cambridge-shire, October 30; Dewhurst Plate, October 31.

Joseph A. Murphy, the western racing official who expects to manage the Buffalo track this year, says that the report that L. A. Cella will be connected with the venture is not true. Murphy admitted that he was friendly with Cella, and that at one time he made a proposition to Cella to take hold of a certain track. But that was all he said. The Jockey club is making a careful investigation with the idea of keeping the track out of the hands of the western element in turf affairs.

Oregon Postoffice Lore.

Postoffice Inspector Riches, of Portland, owns a copy of a "List of Postoffices of the United States," which was issued by the government in 1862. The list has been, until recently in the possession of John Hedden, postmaster at Scottsburg, Douglas county, Oregon, who had it from the government soon after publication.

Scottsburg is one of the oldest postoffices in the state, and Mr. Hedden was its first postmaster. In 1862 Oregon had 59 postoffices. In Multnomah county there were three, Portland, Springfield and Sandy. Polk county led in the number of postoffices having 13. Marion county came next with 19. "Wascopum" county is credited with one and Waaco county with one. Wascopum county's office was at Hood River. There were 20 counties in Oregon in 1862; the state having made a gain of 13 counties since that time.
