REFERENDUM SIGNED.

Circulation Is Commenced by Grange Committee Yesterday.

Albany special: Petitions calling for a referendum vote on the University of Oregon appropriation bill passed by the last legislature were being circulated in Albany by members of the Linn county grange. The petitions were printed prior to the meeting held last Saturday when it was decided to invoke the referendum upon the University of Oregon appropriation, and their circulation was commenced the first thing Monday morning. The work is going on under the direction of the joint committee of the Linn county grange, appointed for that purpose.

That the move of the Linn county grange to invoke the referendum is looked upon with favor by a large number of persons was shown by the experience of those securing names for the petition. Their success seemed to be almost universal and they state that very few persons refused to affix their signature to the petition, when it had been explained. One petition circulated by C. H. Walker was quickly filled and was filed by County Clerk J. W. Miller who will forward it to the secretary of state. The petition filed contains the names of two of the heaviest taxpayers in Linn county, the mayor of Albany, county judge, two ex-sheriffs of Linn county besides others prominent persons.

The other petitions which are being circulated throughout the county, the committee reported, were being rapidly signed, and it was anticipated that there would be no difficulty in securing the required number of signatures in time.

The Armory Referendum.

It is proposed to referendum the \$100,000 appropriation by the late legislature for militia armories. It would not be a misdirected effort. The days of wars are passing. Rigid Boat Inspection Ordered.

New York, April 3.—Steamboat, tug and barge captains whose craft carrying inspection certificates issued by the New York office of the Federal Hull and Boilers' Inspection service, have been surprised by a new and stringent order from Inspector General Adler, providing that renewals of certificates this season shall depend upon the examination of various craft by inspectors who did not make the preceding inspection and who shall give no warning of their official visit.

The new order further provides that, in addition to the regular inspection, re-inspection of ferryboats and excursion boats shall be made at least three times a season. Six of the inspectors have been removed temporarily to other districts on the Atlantic coast, and other places have been filled from Philadelphia.

Inspection of boats that have been overhauled for the summer service will be made sometime in April. Again some time in June, after the excursion season opens the first re-inspection will be made, and there will be two more in the summer at times when the skippers are least expecting them. The ferries, tugs, and coast wise steamers plying to New York have been undergoing annual inspection since the first of March.

Anniversary of Lend-a-hand.

Boston, April 3.—This is the 85th anniversary of the birth of Rev. Dr. Edward Everett Hale, and the dearest wish of his heart is fulfilled today when the Lend-a-Hand society, of which he is the founder, and for which he has spent so much time and labor, the most beloved production of his brain and heart and life, is to become a permanent organization.

All the members of the society and the friends of the organizations have contributed to an endowment fund, which places the organization upon a permanent footing, and it is expected that before the day is done, all the money required will be paid in.

"If I never see you again I do happen for your efforts to make my work permanent," said Dr. Hale, when it was first proposed to endow the Lend-a-Hand society. Governor Guild is chairman of the honorary committee, which includes 16 representative men and women from various parts of the country. The society was formed some 35 years ago, and 15 years later the Lend-a-Hand magazine organ of the club, was first issued. The Lend-a-Hand club is found in all churches of all denominations, and the Lend-a-Hand society is the organized one of the clubs.
