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**HARRIMAN HEARING COMPLETE**

**"Don't Pick Out One for the Sins of Many"**

**Is the Plea of Lawyeas Who Want Fair Play**

Washington, April 5.—Attorney Milburn today concluded his argument in favor of Harriman before the interstate commerce commission, maintaining that the acquisition of the Southern Pacific by the Union Pacific was not in violation of the Sherman act, indicating their defense if the government institutes a suit upon the basis of the commission's findings.

Milburn made a plea for fair play, and said that before the report was submitted to inquire into the Pennsylvania and Vanderbilt lines, the Northern Pacific, the Rock Island and Great Northern. They are all parallel and competing lines, and were when the Sherman law was passed. This has been going on the same as now under the eyes of the commission for years. Let this body consider the peoples questions calmly, paying no attention to the cry of politicians. "Don't pick us out, but treat all alike."

Attorney Severance, for the government, endeavored to show that the Sherman law was violated; that the Union Pacific controlled the Illinois central, and that both the Southern and Union got into Portland and competed for trade to that point, before the merger.

Lincoln, Neb., April 5.—Governor Sheldon today said the influence of Harriman and the Union Pacific was small in that state; that the people ruled Nebraska, and the people were for Roosevelt.

Washington, April 5.—Some Harriman newspapers in this city and New York and Washington correspondents of these papers are hinting derogatively that the President's nerves are unstrung, and that his mental condition is such that he needs absolute rest. The general body of correspondents here do not share the above, but fully agree with the President.

**Kicks Against Traction Company.**  
Norfolk, Va., April 5.—The state corporation commission is hearing today Mayor Reed's complaint against the Norfolk and Portsmouth Traction company's local service. Joseph E. Willard, a member of the commission, has been in Portsmouth and has made a special inspection of the local service, about which the mayor complains. The mayor is so hostile in this matter, as he wants the city to put its best foot forward in the accommodation of passengers bound to or from the Jamestown exposition.

**POSTMASTER LACHNER, ASSISTANT PACKWOOD.**  
Baker City, April 5.—The formal commission of W. J. Lachner as postmaster of Baker City arrived yesterday, and that gentleman will today take charge of the Baker City postoffice. He has appointed as his chief assistant William H. Packwood, Sr., who himself was a candidate for the office at one time during the winter. Mr. Lachner proposes to put the Baker City postoffice on an up-to-date basis, and will soon have all the details of the different departments in his hands.

For white teachers Friday and Saturday, April 19 and 20. For colored teachers Friday and Saturday, April 26 and 27. The state board of examiners prepared the list of examinations.
