## BEAUCHAMP GIVEN VERDICT.

Jury in the Dr. H. Beauchamp vs. Mutual Life Case Gives Plaintiff \$260—Other Business.

The jury in the damage suit of Dr. H. Beauchamp vs. the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company, incorporated in the state of New York, after being in the jury room less than an hour this morning, shortly before 12 o'clock brought in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$269.17. The complaint sets forth six causes for action, all 7 of which show the company to have failed in their contract to issue policies to applicants after accepting their money.

Dr. Beauchamp claimed \$50 for medical service performed for said defendant. The complaint asked for \$315.17. John H. and C. L. McNary appeared for plaintiff and Attorneys Veazle and Martin represented the defense.

Other docket entries have been made as follows:  
V. H. Caldwell vs. George Fendrich, jury trial.

F. H. Vanderhoof plead not guilty to the charge of having forged instrument in his possession, with intent to utter same. The plaintiff was yesterday found guilty of a similar charge, and bail was fixed at \$1000. There were in all three indictments against Vanderhoof.

## VANDERHOOF GUILTY.

Jury After an Hour's Deliberation Brings in Verdict of Guilty.

F. H. Vanderhoof was yesterday found guilty of forgery after the jury had been out less than an hour.

The charge in the complaint sets forth that Vanderhoof forged and passed the following promissory note:

\$27.00 Nov. 12, 1906.  
Ninety days after date I promise to pay to the order of F. H. Vanderhoof, twenty-seven dollars.

Monday morning at 9 o'clock was set as the time for pronouncing sentence.

## Opening the Market for Text-Books in Tennessee.

Nashville, Tenn., April 5.—The parents of school children are much interested in a bill before the legislature allowing general trade in school books. The bill amends the Tennessee law so that any merchant may buy or sell text-books that are adopted by the state authorities. It prescribes that the contractor shall deliver to any merchant any adopted school book that may be contracted for. It is made a misdemeanor to refuse to deliver the books or to ship and supply them as ordered. This will make a great difference in the school book trade.

## Jamestown Exposition Notes.

Ten tons, in the way of a magnificent organ, costing \$50,000, will be installed on the stage of the Auditorium and Convention Hall.

Immense towers will be erected at the ends of the Grand Piers to house the exhibits of the life saving and light house service.

The waters of Hampton Roads could accommodate 1500 of the largest battleships ever produced.

Fort Monroe, four miles across the waters of Hampton Roads is the chief artillery station of the United States government on the Atlantic coast.

The village of Arts and Crafts will house the old Colonial industries that will be reproduced by skilled workmen at the Jamestown Exposition.

A hall of Modern Inventions will be a novel feature in the exposition. A surgeon and an able corps of assistants will be in attendance all the time at the exposition grounds.

The first university of the country was established in 1619 in Henrico county, Virginia, not over 50 miles from the grounds of the Jamestown exposition.

### Railroad Line to Be Extended.

Dresden, Tenn., April 5.—Notwithstanding the fact that many of the big lines are cancelling their orders for extensions and improvements on account of the difficulty of procuring money on easy terms, the Mobile, Jackson & Kansas City railroad will extend its line from Middleburg, Tenn., to the Ohio river, and from a junction with the astern Illinois branch of the Rock Island and 'Frisco system at either Paducah, Ky., or Joppa, Ill. The extension to Paducah will be 16 miles, and to Joppa 150 miles, and would parallel the Illinois Central railroad. Whether this new road touches Joppa, Ill., or Paducah, Ky., it will touch Mayfield, Ky., and is almost sure to touch Dresden, the narrow-gauge having been made through Dresden thence to Jackson, going by the little village of Rida, south of here.

### Annual Mormon Conference.

Salt Lake, April 5.—President Jos. F. Smith, before 7000 people gathered at the 75th annual conference of the Mormon church today announced that the last year of the million dollar bond issue of the organization was paid, and that it cost no man or woman a cent.
