BEAUCHAMP GIVEN VERDICT.

Jury in the Dr. H. Beauchamp vs. Mutual Life Case Gives Plaintiff \$269-Other Business.

The jury in the damage suit of Dr. H. Beauchamp vs. the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company, incorporated in the state of New York, after being in the jury room less than an hour this morning, shortly before 12 o'clock brought in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff for \$269.17.

The complaint sets forth six causes for action, all 7of which show the company to have failed in their contract to issue policies to applicants after accepting their money.
