ADAMS IS STILL ALIVE

National Only at Times—Gangrene From Old Age Caused Trouble

A Journal reporter called at the F. McAdams residence on North Commercial street yesterday, and the man, who, if reports are correct, has broken Dr. Tanner's record. The now withered form of Adams is literally starving to death. The Journal erred in yesterday's account, in saying that the operation on the unfortunate man's leg was for rheumatism. Mr. McAdams formerly had rheumatism, but his present trouble arose from gangrene, caused from old age. Upon entering the room yesterday the sick man lay, one was giving the impression of entering into the presence of the sacred dead. With the exception of a wild twitch of the sufferer lay motionless. His eyes were staring and scan his face with almost a superhuman effort. A beard has grown over his face, and his gray hair falls heavily over his well-formed forehead. Mr. McAdams has been a fine-looking man, and, for his age, and suffering that he has endured, the remarkable length of time he has gone without food, is preserved at present. When asked if he was suffering any great pain, yesterday, he replied almost in a whisper, without a perceptible quiver of his body, that he did not suffer now. He immediately fell into a slumber, and seemed to be sleeping easily.

Mr. McAdams said that he has been afflicted previous to this present trouble with rheumatism, but several months ago he suffered inconvenience in getting about, owing to the stiffness of his feet, which were afflicted with gangrene. He doctored about the effect desired, and 41 days ago two of his toes were amputated.

The toes healed as well as might expected, but the gangrene set in upon his foot, and at present has rotted away nearly all the foot. The gangrene is said to be brought on by old age, and has no connection with rheumatism.

Mr. McAdams said that since the operation, 41 days ago, the afflicted man has taken no nourishment into his stomach, with the exception of a small amount of chicken broth, which he has been drinking.

Mr. McAdams said that he has been drinking water quite freely, and the odor of cooking viands does not turn sick.

The pulse yesterday was said to be very good, but he is rapidly growing weaker, and the end is probably not far off.

M. B. A. Celebrate Anniversary.
Last night Portland and Chemawa lodges of the Modern Brotherhood of America celebrated the 10th anniversary of the founding of their order at Chemawa, and also the paying off of the mortgage of the lodge building at that place.

The Portland degree team was present and conducted the initiation and floor work, there being about 20 candidates for the Chemawa lodge.

The lodge, about four years ago purchased the ground on which to build its hall, and erected a fine two-story frame building, which is valued at about \$3000.

A large crowd was present, including lodge members from all over the state.

After the meeting an elaborate banquet was served, and the program ended with a dance, for which excellent music was furnished by the local orchestra.

HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETICS

Debating League Is Also Being Formed On Triangular Plan

At the meeting held in Eugene for the purpose of forming an athletic league among the valley schools the ball was started rolling in one of the most creditable projects ever taken up by the high schools of this part of the country. At the meeting at Eugene five schools were represented: Albany high school, by Supt. Sanders, of the Albany schools; Roseburg high school, by Supt. Davee, of Roseburg; President Bigger, of Drain normal, for his school; Supt. Arnold and Principal Cleveland, for Eugene high school, and Prof. E. T. Mariatte was sent by the representatives of the Salem high school. The meeting was held in the Eugene high school building, where the different points of the project were discussed and a constitution drawn up. No permanent officers were elected at this meeting, as the league cannot be hoped to be fully organized and in working order until this fall, when it will be ready for the opening of the football season. Prof. Mariatte was chosen as temporary secretary to handle all correspondence until the next meeting, which is to be held in this city July 1, 2 and 3, when permanent officers will be elected, and the league will be fully organized. At this next meeting several other schools will be taken into the league.

The Constitution.
The constitution, which was drawn up, is indeed a creditable one, and every point over which any discussion might arise has been covered in a precise manner, which will settle all disputes which may arise over games, eligibility of a player, etc.

The name chosen for the league is the Western Oregon Interscholastic Athletic League, and under Article I, Section 1, Drain, Roseburg, Albany, Eugene and Salem are listed as the charter members.

In article II, the purpose of the league is shown: "The object of this league shall be to hold annual athletic contests under uniform conditions."

Article III provides for an executive committee composed of the principals or their accredited representatives of their schools. It also provides for officials selected from the executive committee.

Article IV deals with the eligibility of a contestant, and is perhaps one of the most important parts of the constitution, as it leaves no possibility of running in what are known as "ringers."

It says, section 1: "Contesting students must be amateurs according to the rules of the A. A. U." Section 2: "Participants in contests between members of this league must be regularly enrolled, under graduates students taking not less than 15 recitation periods per week, and furthermore must have a passing grade in each subject, which must have been maintained for three weeks previous and up to the date of the contest, or from the beginning of the term, provided the school has not been in session for three weeks."

Section 3. Any player of any team of the league shall not be allowed to play on any other team of the league during that season.

Section 4. Any student playing in any athletic contest in any season who drops out of school upon the close of that season without having made a satisfactory term grade, or

is dropped by the institution because of a failure to keep up with his class work, shall be required to attend school for three successive months before he can again contest."

There is also a clause for enforcing these rules, and for settling all questions which may arise. No loophole has been left by which any person not properly qualified may get onto any team of this league.

Article V deals with contracts for games, and the means by which they are secured and arranged.

Article VI deals with the field of play.

Article VII provides for time of contests, expense of games prevented by weather conditions and the settlement of discussions on the field.

Article VIII provides for the settlement of appeals and protests, and in section 2 a very important rule is made, which will undoubtedly secure cleaner play.

"On complaint of any member of this league to the executive committee any athlete who shall be adjudged guilty of unsportsmanlike conduct by the committee; shall be debarred forever from any athletic event under the auspices of this league."

Article IX arranges for the championship, which of late years has caused a great dispute, as nearly every school claims it. It says: "The championship shall be determined by a percentage, based on the number of games won out of the total number played in the regular complete schedule. The championship team of each division shall meet to determine the Western Oregon championship."

Article X deals with the matters of officials for all games.

Article XI is one that will cause great rivalry among the different schools. It says: "A trophy, the character of which shall be determined by the executive committee, shall be presented to the champion team at the close of any athletic season, which trophy shall become the permanent property of the school."

In article XII, which is the last, arrangements are made for an equal bearing of all legitimate expenses of the league, and gives the executive committee power to regulate all points not covered by the constitution.

It seems that the committee at Eugene certainly did a good job, and should receive much credit for it. The people of Eugene treated all of the representatives royally while in their city.

The Debating League.
While the representatives of these schools were together at Eugene they

went over and discussed the debating league, which was formed some time ago. If they had had the power some changes would have been made, but, not having the power, they simply formulated a new plan, which will undoubtedly be put into effect in a short time.

The debating plan was suggested by Supt. Mott Arnold and Principal Cleveland of E. H. S., and is what is known as the double triangular system, the same as is in use between the universities of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Medford and Eugene wish to come into this league.

The system would be to have two teams for each school, one a home team, and the other a traveling team and all debates would be held by the different schools on the same night. The system will probably replace the one now in use.
