## STATE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Has No Authority to Demand Closing of Trains.

The attorney-general today decided that the State Board of Health has no authority, under the law, to have passenger trains stopped and cleaned at certain points, where it was proposed that the railroad companies should allow all passengers to get off while the cars were being disinfected, sanitized and swept, according to rules of the board.

The attorney-general holds that they cannot make or enforce such rules under the quarantine section of the law, except in time of epidemic, and in cases of infection or to stop spread of contagious diseases. The law does not apply to travel under ordinary conditions.

### Hammock Receives Sentence—

Sanford Hammock, the man who on last Wednesday was arraigned in department No. 1 of the circuit court and pleaded guilty to taking \$25 from the pockets of Emil Bier, who was intoxicated, was this morning given a sentence of \$100 fine. He was committed to the county jail until the fine is paid. Imprisonment was to exceed 50 days.

### Bell Assistant Cook—

William Bell, the gray-haired forger, who was recently posing as Canadian capitalist, is now working in the kitchen in the penitentiary.

### Brief Telegrams.

At Lodz, Polish Russia, ten workmen were shot and killed in the factory district today, because they attempted to resume work. The managers desire to re-employ men, but the strikers refuse to allow them to resume work.

At a fire in the South Washington, insane asylum this morning one inmate was killed, the others being rescued. The property loss is not great.

Ballard, Wash.—At a special election today will decide whether to be annexed to Seattle. It annexed Seattle will gain 20,000 population.

### Sentenced for Life.

Newkirk, Okla., April.—Kodak S. Morris, aged 65, one of the wealthiest men in Oklahoma, was today declared guilty of murdering Woodford P. Cassidy and son, as the result of a land lease quarrel. He was sentenced for life.
