An Old Oregon Case.

Los Angeles, April 8.—One of the largest petitions in years was today filed by A. T. Gilbert, a real estate dealer of South Pasadena, and formerly owner of the Gilbert Bros. bank at Salem, Oregon. The Gilbert Bros. bank in Salem failed about five years ago, and a majority of the \$445,229 in claims acknowledged in the petition today are the result of that failure. Most of these claims, however, are classed as "unfounded claims."

The largest single claimant is Timmon Ford, a prominent attorney, and executor of the estate of William Cosper, of Salem, Oregon, whose claim is given at \$350,000. There are 334 unsecured creditors, nearly all of Salem. Gilbert's assets consist of clothing worth \$50. Judge Bellinger, of the federal court in Oregon, where bankruptcy proceedings were asked, held that Gilbert Bros. were not insolvent. The estate paid 35 cents on the dollar.

Railroad Employers' Liability.

Washington, April 8.—The supreme court of the United States hearing today the motion made by Attorney General Bonaparte pointing the government to intervene in the case of Damselle Howard against the Illinois Central Railroad company. The case involves the constitutionality of the railroad employers' liability act. It was tried by the United States circuit court for the western district of Tennessee, who held the first section of the act, abolishing the fellow servant rule, to be unconstitutional.
