KNIFE CAUSES TROUBLE

Chris Bloss Struck in Face and Robert Boliver Knocked Down

There was a general mix in Eckerlen barroom yesterday afternoon, when William Dawne struck Chris Bloss in the face, and Rely knocked Robert Boliver Down, inflicting painful wounds, among which was the loss of four of his front teeth. It seems that Dawn and Bloss had traded pocket knives, but each one had a different understanding of the transaction, and Bloss wanted his knife back. Young Dawn, who is a husky fellow, was in the Eckerlen cafe barroom with several friends, and entered into a conversation about the knife exchange. He soon lost his temper and struck Bloss in the face, inflicting a painful bruise. Bloss, who is an old man, had been talking to Robert Boliver, of Zena, concerning a prospective cow trade, and as he was struck, so witnesses say, he turned and asked Boliver if he saw Dawn hit him. Boliver replied that he had seen the blow struck, and then started toward the door, but before reaching the exit some unseen pair of fists began hostilities against his face. He was knocked down before he realized just what was being done, and when picked up he was missing four good teeth, and had several ugly cuts about his nose and face. Warrants were sworn out for the arrest of Wm. Rely, who, witnesses said, was the man who struck Boliver, and also for Dawne. Chief of Police Gibson soon brought the last named man before Judge Moores who gave him some good advice on controlling his fiery temper, fined him \$10 and turned him loose. Dawne admitted that he had done wrong, especially in striking an old man. Boliver said that he did not know any of the crowd of horse traders that were in the saloon at the time, and really could not say just who hit him, but would like to see the man who used his fists so cleverly. Dr. J. N. Smith dressed his wounds, and after swearing out a warrant for Rely, Boliver left for his home near Zena.

Rely was arrested at the Salem Hotel late last evening, and taken to the city hall, where he was fined \$35. Refusing to pay his fine he was placed in the city jail, where he will probably remain until the \$35 is paid.

No Injunction on State Street.

The report was circulated upon the streets this morning that injunction proceedings were to be brought against the improvement of State street, and that the moving party was George Rayne, who owns the Bayne block, and that Attorney John Bayne, his brother, was about to take the necessary legal steps. A Journal reporter therefore called upon the latter gentleman, and he very frankly stated that there was absolutely nothing to it. He said also that he had no knowledge of anyone else contemplating such action, and that he would, under no circumstances take part in such proceedings, owing to the fact that, as a councilman, it would place him in a dual capacity before the community, which he could not sanction.
