CAMPAIGN OF THE TAXPAYER.

The fight to apply the referendum to about half a million of unnecessary appropriations is the battle of the taxpayer.

It is not a campaign against higher education at state expense, but for the right to **HOLD IN CHECK RECKLESS LEGISLATION.**

The facts will be brought out and the people protected against similar raids in the future.

One fact has just come to light—the State University has been on a basis of **\$80,000 PER YEAR THE PAST TWO YEARS.**

This is let out by a statement that appears in many of the state papers from the president of the University.

The University is trying to force the whole contention into a question of voting up or down that institution. **THAT IS NOT THE ISSUE.**

The taxpayer's referendum campaign is a general attempt to hold down by means of the referendum the aggregate of the appropriations. The people will vote on each separate item that is referred—**IT IS NOT A FIGHT ON THE UNIVERSITY OR HIGHER EDUCATION.**

It should also be remembered that the total demands for higher education at this session aggregate over a half million.

It is a question of reasonableness and justice to all interests. The state-aided institutions have overreached themselves.

DOING SOME PRACTICAL WORK.

The Oregon State Railroad Commission is doing some practical work for the people of this state.

It has interested itself in such common, everyday affairs as **LOOKING AFTER CAR SHORTAGE.**

It has sent out requests for information as to the sanitary conditions of water closets at station houses.

An order has been secured that will require bulletins to be posted showing how much trains are late.

April 16th there will be a hearing at Salem of the **COMPLAINT OF THE SAWMILL MEN ABOUT THE RAISE IN RATES.**

The Traveling Men's Protective Association have just made an argument for a reduced rate on mileage books.

They will be given a special hearing May 6th. These are all matters of vital importance to the people of Oregon.

Back of all their work the commission are animated by **AN EARNEST DESIRE FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE WHOLE STATE.**

The commission are not given to many grand stand plays so far, but seem open to engagements of the humbler sort.

BOURNE GAVE A DINNER.

That Has Put the Administration at His Back.

Washington special: Senator Bourne woke up to find himself famous. "The Bourne dinner" was exploited in every big eastern paper—the dinner at which Senator Penrose gave away the full story of the Harriman-Rockefeller-Hearst-Wall street conspiracy to unhorse Mr. Roosevelt. The publicity was unsought by Mr. Bourne, but his fame spread in spite of him, and today he was the most-sought man in Washington.

But it profited newspaper men nothing to interview Oregon's new senator. To one and all he declared he had nothing to say other than what he told the Oregonian correspondent last night—that he had given several dinners and attended others; that he could not, as host, discuss just what took place at his own table any more than he could, as guest, discuss what transpired at the festive board of a friend.

In spite of Mr. Bourne's reticence, it seems to be generally understood by newspaper men in Washington that Mr. Penrose made his notorious "break" at Bourne's dinner, and one senator who was present has admitted as much.

Mr. Bourne had a long talk with the President, but, had nothing for publication when he left the White House. Neither had the White House any new light to throw on the situation. Apparently, the "Bourne dinner" is considered as having passed into history, but, in passing, it brought into great prominence the name of Oregon's new senator, and emphasized to the country that Mr. Bourne is not only in close touch with the administration, but is a frequent caller at the White House and in mighty good standing with the President. If Mr. Bourne gave the dinner, he was instrumental in rendering the administration a service of inestimable value.

Regardless of what Mr. Penrose said and what lay behind it, the administration has turned a mighty clever trick and outwitted the men most anxious to obliterate Mr. Roosevelt and his policies.

Bourne for Third Term.

The Washington Herald contains the following:

A Herald reporter last evening, in view of the fact that Oregon will be the first state to name delegates, asked Senator Bourne as to the probable choice of his people in the matter of a candidate for the Presidency.

"My belief," said he, "that conditions will be such as to render the Oregon delegation in the Republican convention favorable to the renomination of President Roosevelt. The mass of the voters of the Northwest place implicit reliance on the honesty, patriotism and ability of the President. At times his administration has been far from popular in our section, and there was consider-

able adverse criticism at the time of the San Francisco-Japanese imbroglio. But afterward it seemed apparent that the President was going to achieve by diplomacy what our people mainly wished, the exclusion of the Japanese coolies, and so the earlier antagonism was allayed. A man of the President's prodigious activity may occasionally come in for a 'popular roast,' but the splendid and beneficent things he accomplishes completely cancel any errors. "On the other side of the house, the nomination of Colonel Bryan seems assured. He is far and away the strongest man in his party, and everywhere in the west he numbers his admirers by the thousands. But Colonel Bryan with all his good qualities, could hardly be expected to carry forward the policies of Roosevelt to any such satisfactory degree as the man who originated them. The hand that undertakes a task is the proper one to finish it."

Coal Is Found in Malheur County.

It is among the possibilities that a repetition of last winter's coal famine will be prevented next winter, if not from another source, from ample shipments from a mine in Malheur county, Oregon, 28 miles southeast of Nyssa.

J. F. Cooney, city plumbing inspector, who with other Boise men, Chas. Lyons, A. S. Whitney and John McElroy is interested in the mine and have just received good news from the property where a good strike has been made in coal. Mr. Cooney states that the workers had driven in about 700 feet when they struck four feet of clear anthracite, with indications of from 8 to 10 feet of clear coal. Mr. Cooney says he would not be surprised to learn that there will be enough of it to warrant regular shipments to Boise next winter.—Boise Statesman.

World's Largest Building.

The giant building of the world the Church street terminal station of the Hudson and Manhattan railroad, will not only be the largest but it will be the heaviest building in Manhattan. The structural steel necessary to hold up the structure will alone weigh over 24,000 tons, and the whole building, when completed will have a theoretical living and dead load of 200,000 tons. Sixteen million three hundred thousand bricks will be necessary to build the structure above the curb line, enough if placed end to end to reach over 2000 miles, or from New York to Salt Lake City. It will provide for the passing of 1000 persons a minute through the corridors.
