SPRING FASHIONS IN NEW YORK

Imported Costumes and Practical Suits—Fancy Effects in Stripes and Checks—Very Light Colorings—Brown, Black and Navy Blue—Devices Used to Produce the Trim Figure—Lines That Present Modes Demand.

For the past few weeks New York has been having a veritable "Carnival of Fashions" though this is the season of sackcloth. Opening after opening has been held at the representative stores, and at the more private establishments where fine attire is dealt in to say nothing of the displays of practical suits made by manufacturers here.

Very Light Colors.

White or very light colored gowns with colored stripes as well as checks of similar style, are among the most notable showings of the season. Wonderfully elaborate effects are obtained by using, in the same suit, stripes running lengthwise, across, and biased at different angles. The whole trimming effect being obtained by these line arrangements.

Slender Effects.

In the hands of a skilled tailor apparent slenderness is produced in figure that without help of some sort would be much too heavy to be ranked in this class.

Trimness of Line Essential.

The present modes demand great trimness and trimness of line, hence the fit of the corset and underwear becomes a matter of even more than usual importance. Every woman with a well developed figure should wear some form of support above the upper line of the corset and many devices have been made for this purpose. Through the courtesy of Arthur Frankenstein & Co. we are able to illustrate a new garment of this sort known as the "Corsette" which is especially to be commended:



Made of fine batiste, trimmed with lace and ribbon, with flexible boning and a back of elastic webbing, this little bodice fits any figure and insures the lines that are essential to the proper fit of the outer apparel, whether it be a dressy costume or a simple shirt waist. As this launders well, and can be had at small cost, it all up to date corset departments, so women should be obliged to go about looking dowdy for the want of it.

New Shirt Waists.

With practical suits the extra point is just as much to the fore as ever. Shirt waists of a washable sort, made of linen and fine cottons have very full, much pleated fronts, and close down the center with a narrow box plait edge with narrow pointed cuffs. Embroidered turn-over collars are the most fashionable feature with these, and little but-

terfly bows are used more than any other form of necktie.

Colored Borders.

There is a veritable rage for bordered effects, which is manifested in all kinds of goods, from stamped silks and chiffons for function gowns that sell up to \$12 per yard to colored bordered handkerchiefs—pretty ones too—that sell for 25 cents each. Colored borders on turn over collars of white linen, on pleatings and the small frilly bows mentioned as leaders are great favorites.

New Gloves.

Gloves continue long to meet the three quarter or half sleeves, that will surely last through the summer. Besides the silk gloves we are told that long lace mitts will be worn this year. Many of the new silk gloves have tops made fanciful by embroideries and by lace insets.

Hat Wrinklers.

Mushroom shapes hold the first place, but these are shown in such diverse models that the only point of resemblance among them lies in the fact that their rims all droop. Crowns are low, high, round, or square, and rims fall suddenly, or turn down in a saucer like curve. Some are wide and some are narrow, and many are both, being narrowed to almost nothing in front and widened out to great extent at the back of the hat.

Colored Straws.

Decided colors in straws are liked, replacing the colored felts so smartly worn last winter, and on many of these the same rose trimmings are used.

Track Meet at Whitman.

The seventh annual interscholastic track meet and declamation contest will be held in Walla Walla on May 2nd and 3d. This year the college extends its invitation to include the leading schools of Idaho as well as eastern Oregon and eastern Washington, thus giving an opportunity for determining the athletic championship of the Inland Empire. New features are introduced this year in this tri-state meet, the college undertaking to pay the railroad expenses of ten representatives from each of the leading high schools, and to provide free entertainment during their stay in Walla Walla. Among the schools which will take part are Boise, Lewiston, Baker City, La Grande, Pendleton, The Dalles, Walla Walla, Dayton, Spokane, Riverville, North Yakima and perhaps others. The Commercial club of Walla Walla has undertaken to back the college in assuming the financial responsibilities for this expensive athletic gathering.

The events will be 50 yards dash, 100 yards dash, 220 yards dash, 440 yards dash, half mile run, mile run, putting the shot, throwing the hammer, hurling the discus, running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, 120 yards hurdle race, 220 yards hurdle race and relay race (half mile). The declamation contest will occur on the night of May 2nd. Prizes will be given for the winners in all events; a gold medal for the first prize, silver medal for the second prize, and a bronze medal for the third. The school winning the relay race will receive a handsome silver cup, which it is allowed to retain its possession for the year, but not in permanent possession until it has been won three times.

Pearsons academy, the preparatory department of Whitman college, will not enter the meet, nor will any representative of the college take part in any of the events. The schools invited are guests of the institution, and the Whitman students will play the part of hosts to the best of their ability.—Dufer Dispatch.
