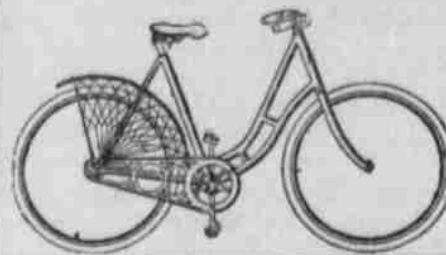

Prepared for the Public Schools and the Family Circle.

before holding a general election. He believes it would be dangerous at present.
