SECOND MILL IN THE WORLD.

Smith Company Will Build It at Marshfield—Daily Capacity of 250,000 Feet.

The second largest sawmill on the Pacific coast, with a daily capacity of 250,000 feet, is to be located at Marshfield, Coos Bay, by the C. A. Smith Company, which owns the largest sawmill in the world, located at Minneapolis.

The structure will be about 70x400 feet. The company will put in a bath mill of its own design.

It is estimated that the total cost of the plant will be about \$150,000 and that eight months' time will be required to complete it.

Prevention of Consumption.

Ottawa, Ont., April 12.—The outcome of the convention in this city of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Consumption is that a substantial advance in public sentiment and in public interest in the subject has been evinced throughout the domain, and it is felt that the convention did a great deal of good. Some of the statements reported at the association meeting showed that the death rate from consumption in Canada had increased in ten years from 15.5 to 18 per thousand, which is pronounced truly alarming. The report points with some degree of pride to the fact that a decrease of 86 lives in the last year of the decade was shown. This is undoubtedly a noble and worthy work, and deserving of every encouragement. The report ascribes all this, not to any nostrum, but to the dissemination of sound and sensible directions as to the proper and reasonable use of all the latest ideas on the subject, and especially to the abundant and scientific use of pure air, and the practical living out in the open, and the subjecting of the body to all the purifying and strengthening influences of a style of living that gives the body, and especially the lungs the benefit of all the beneficial effects of pure air and right living.

Two Convicts Attempted Escape.

Two convicts who were employed yesterday to help the excavation work on the east wing of the asylum took advantage of their guards and were making their escape when they were discovered by one of the patients of the asylum, who immediately gave an alarm. Guard Busick and one of the attendants at the asylum started in pursuit, and soon had their men surrounded in a hop house at Walker's nursery, which is about half a mile northeast of the asylum. As the convicts were unarmed they were soon captured and returned to the prison. The convicts, after their escape, started eastward, but were headed off at the road turning toward the Savage farm by Officer Busick, who had pursued them on a bicycle. One of the men was captured outside of the hop house, which they attempted to reach, and the other man ran into the hop house and crawled into the hop stove.

IS A LOGGING ROAD A COMMON CARRIER?

Contention in Complaint Filed With Railroad Commission.

Astoria, April 12.—(Special)—Samuel Connell, president and manager of the Northwest Door Company, of Portland, has sent a formal protest to the State Railroad Commission, now in session at Salem, against the Benson logging road. He outlines grievances against the road which, he claims, have been of 15 months' standing, and from which he has been unable to secure any relief, though he has tried repeatedly.

Connell owns a sawmill about four miles from Clatskanie, and quite a large tract of timber land in the vicinity. The finished output of this mill furnishes the material for the Northwest Door Company, on the East Side, but Connell says he has been unable to operate his road because the Benson road has refused to haul the product from the mill to Clatskanie, where the A. & C. road would pick up the haul and deliver at the door of the factory in Portland.

Connell, in his complaint, states that the road has continually refused to move his lumber for 15 months, although the A. & C. road has promised to furnish the cars. It is understood that the Benson road claims that it is a private concern, and does not have to abide by the mandates of the railroad commission, as the regular common carriers do, but Connell, on the other hand, insists that the tariff schedules of the Benson road are filed with the Southern Pacific and the O. R. & N. and the Northern Pacific, and that it is, therefore, to be classed as a common carrier, and under the jurisdiction of the state commission.
