The magnificent plans of New York York in the way of subways, bridges, and the like, bid fair to have a check if the city finances do not improve. The city financial officials are face to face with the conclusion that the city is confronted with the necessity of rigid economy in expenditures. They take it for granted that there must be an era of retrenchment all along the lines. The new court house scheme will probably be abandoned temporarily, as well as Borough President Ahearn's plan for a new sewer system. The proposition of Bridge Commissioner Stevenson for a new East river bridge will also go by the board, and should the city find itself compelled to build its own subways there is likelihood that only the Lexington avenue line will be built, and the seventh and eighth avenue lines would cost approximately \$40,000,000. According to a report submitted to Mayor McClellan by the advisory committee on taxation and finance the city's predicament is due to the debt limit. The commission regards the city finances in such a light that they advise the passage of a constitutional amendment increasing the city's debt-making power. The report set forth that the city is committed to certain improvements, such as school houses, the Hudson Memorial bridge, the subway loop between the bridges and the enlarged Bellevue hospital. These and other improvements, including subways, would bring the expenditures about \$25,000,000 beyond the estimated debt limit within the next five years.

The revivals started in Brooklyn have not been without an effect, as booksellers state that there is some danger of a Bible famine in that borough owing to the unusually large sale of religious books, particularly the Bible during the last month. Bookmen, and especially those who carry an extensive line of Bibles, attribute the boom in the religious literature market to the wave of religious awakening which had been witnessed in Brooklyn since the advent of Gypsy Smith and other evangelists. A great number of booksellers, who formerly carried a limited assortment of Bibles and religious literature, have been forced to replenish their shelves. The larger department stores report unusual activity in this line of business. And there is still another source from which there is a very pronounced demand for Bibles. Andrew Carnegie's remarks about Wall street and the gambling that is carried on under its name contained in the speech last week before the veteran army telegraphers, throw an interesting sidelight on the position Mr. Carnegie assumed in dealing with Wall street on the occasion of the sale of his steel works to the organizers of the Steel Corporation. He took his pay, not in stock of any kind, but in first mortgage bonds secured by the property he was selling, as well as by all other property owned by the new company. He thus entrenched himself in a position that was safe, no matter how much gambling might be conducted in stock of the new company, and if perchance, anything were to go wrong he would get his property back again. Mr. Carnegie made it clear upon this occasion, if ever there had been any doubt on the point, that he is not much of a gambler himself. He prefers to have the sure side of the bargain.

It brought up some tender memories in many souls to read of the serenade that was given to Ira D. Sankey, the old-time singer of Gospel tunes at the Moody meetings, whose touching voice saved many a soul. Mr. Sankey is blind and bed-ridden, and Rev. In succession there were given a number of Mr. Sankey's favorites, among them "Onward, Christian Soldiers," "When the Mists Have Rolled Away," "Under His Wing" and "No Shadows There." Long before the program was finished the street was filled with people attracted from many points. One could account for the great outdoors at that hour.

Magistrate Crane has given out the information that he and W. E. D. Stokes, who gave children of the Memorial hospital an automobile ride that it is expected to make the movement spread throughout the country. "We are going to make our scheme a national one," said the magistrate. Pittsburg, Pa., April 12.—The foreign guests were given the best the city afforded in hotel accommodation, 100 rooms being engaged for them in Schenley hotel, which was the general headquarters of the visitors, 27 at the County Club, and 30 at Port Hill. Fast automobile service was maintained between the hotels and the club house. The guests were delighted with their treatment, and greatly pleased with the sights and sounds of the great industrial center. The Pittsburg committee was greatly pleased that it was not obliged to send any of the visitors to a private house.
