PRINCIPALS KEEP OUT OF SCHOOL BOOK WAR

One Member of Association Saw Another Member and a Text-book Commissioner at Swell Dinner With Publishers' Agent, so Other Pedagogues Keep Skirts Clear

(Portland Sunday Journal.)

"Shun evil companions, Book agents disdain, Late banquets are dangerous, Don't do it again."

Fireworks was expected to be exploded over the text book question at the regular monthly meeting of the Principals' association held in the high school building yesterday afternoon, but did not blaze. Instead a motion made by Principal S. U. Downs put the whole controversy to sleep quietly, decently and in order. After the meeting had been called to order and the minutes of the previous session had been read and approved. Professor Downs arose and made a motion something to this effect:

"I move," he said, "that this association decide finally at this time that it will give no further consideration to the request of the textbook commission that we make recommendations regarding the books to be chosen for use in the schools." The motion was adopted without a dissenting vote while a slow smile spread over the countenances of several of the dignified teachers of the young. Thus was the possibility of discord and recriminations overcome.

Commission Made Request.

The story goes that some time more than a month ago the textbook commission intimated to the Principals' association that it would be glad to receive recommendations from it as to the books most desirable for use in the schools. The request was voted upon in the meeting of a month ago but was not decided definitely. It was scheduled to come up at the meeting of yesterday for final consideration.

There was some objection to the association making the selection of the text books in the minds of some of the instructors, it being argued that the work of the association had to do with the best methods of in-

structing the young and not with picking out books for a commission appointed for that purpose. The objection, however, was not very decided and it was generally believed that the members of the organization would consent to make at least some recommendations out of the abundance of their experience for the good of the cause.

Since the last meeting, however, a belated friend of a member of the organization happened past an eating resort located on Alder street which bears a name famous for extreme good times, so the tale runs, and there beheld with horrified eyes a prominent member of the commission making exceedingly merry with a representative of a school book concern. The table groaned and creaked with good things to eat and bubble water and the decorum of the schoolroom had been laid aside for once for the gaiety of the banquet hall.

Dark forebodings at once filled the mind of the belated pedestrian. He sought out members of the association and told his tale.

"What," they argued, "can these two brethren, upright though they be, have in common with the official representative of the book company?" The decision was doubtful and so it was quietly determined that the association would take no part in any book selections.

No One Knows Why.

"Why," a prominent member of the association was asked after the meeting had taken action, "why did they settle the book question the way they did?"

"I do not know," was the answer while a subconscious smile gleamed in the pedagogical eyes. "I suppose that the association thought it was not its duty to pick books for a commission whose business was to make the selection. It is a serious and responsible proceeding and it is better not to meddle in it." No mention was made of the squab, the quail or the bubble water.

HAD NARROW ESCAPE.

Two of the girls, Vera Burnett and Isabel Vernon, fell in the river, when Tom Barnes, who was on the bank, jumped in and took them to the bank. John Anderson and a Maynard boy were in a boat on the river, and rescued the girls and boys from the top of the house, and took them to land. They were a frightened lot of young people.

FIRE ON COURT STREET.

The Little Store of D. S. Schenck Destroyed by Fire.

The fire department was called out this morning to put out a blaze which had started in the building owned by J. C. Thompson and occupied by D. S. Schenck, the candy man, on Court street. The fire started in the old attic of the building, from a defective flue, and was making good headway into the building when the department arrived. The fire boys soon extinguished the fire, and succeeded, with the aid of citizens, in saving all the furniture and personal property. The little store is located just west of the building occupied by the Harvey grocery, and had the fire caught in that property the damage would probably have been considerable. The damage was light, as the building burned was a small frame, and only the roof of the front part was destroyed.
