COLONIAL CONFERENCE.

Wilfred Laurier of Canada Is Prominent.

London, April 17.—The colonial conference, which began on the 15th inst., is fairly under way, and the conference of the colonial government is found to be of great profit all concerned.

The coming of General Botha solely to convince Great Britain of the policy of the South Africa Dutch, is considered very significant.

The Canadians are greatly pleased that Sir Wilfred Laurier, premier of the Dominion, overcame his great reluctance to come, to accomplish what he had to overcome some difficulties, and came over to take part in the debates. Sir Wilfred Laurier is very popular, and his speech was an eloquent one. The most serious question is that of imperial union, on which greatly contradictory opinions are held.

The inherent difficulty of the prob-

lem will be to draw the distinction between Great Britain's position as a European power and as the mother country of a great colonial empire. Thus, it will be argued, Great Britain could not expect the colonies to bind themselves to assist her in any European war in which they were not concerned, whilst at the same time, under the existing circumstances and conditions, any colony could embroil Great Britain in war without incurring any but the moral obligation to come to her rescue. The idea is to endeavor if possible to arrive at some agreement of alliance insuring consultation and co-operation in any conflict arising from causes outside of purely European politics, all parties thereto contributing men and money for a common defense upon a population and revenue basis.

Dr. Jameson intended to propose the organization of some plan whereby contributions from each colony should be equitably fixed on the condition the colonies be represented upon the imperial council, at which questions concerning the peace of the empire shall be discussed.

Sir Joseph Ward, of New Zealand, favors increasing the colonial naval contributions to the imperial defense. Australia is determined to bring up the Asiatic exclusion question, and the Hon. Mr. Ward declared on being interviewed on the subject that New Zealand was against the admission of Chinese and Japanese, between whom and New Zealanders he sees the inevitable struggle.

Earl Grey, governor general of Canada, will tonight address the congress. Sir Robert Cranston, Lord Provost of Edinburgh, and William T. Stead will also speak, besides a number of distinguished men. President Diaz telegraphed that he is unable to attend.

conditions on the coast, but it has taken with much reserve the early advances.

"Last year," report J. K. Armsby, "the apricot crop in southern California was the better one. We secured not only better quality, but larger tonnage from the south. Our Los Angeles reports say approximately 40 per cent of apricot crop in southern California is damaged. In the San Joaquin valley apricots are a total failure; in the Santa Clara valley there will be no more than last year, and some varieties will be a total failure. Taking the crop of the state as a whole no one now figures as large a crop of apricots as was produced in 1906. We do not figure that the San Joaquin valley will have a larger total of peaches than last year. In northern California we have been practically unable to get any reports, as the large

est part of that country has been flooded, and travel through the fruit district has been impossible. The growers generally fear damage from blight, signs of which are now in evidence. About 250,000 acres of land in the bean-growing district are submerged. They lie north of San Francisco and are generally termed the Sacramento valley.

ALBANY'S SUICIDE.

Death of Tom Daniels by the Carbolic Route.

Albany Democrat, April 16: Thos. Daniels, an old resident, committed suicide this morning at his home on Geary street, by taking carbolic acid.

He is nightwatch at Veal & Son's chair factory, going home as usual this morning, splitting some wood and going into breakfast, which he ate. Mrs. Daniels finished first and went out doors. Mr. Daniels poured a little coffee into his cup, went into another room, got a bottle down from the clock shelf, poured some of the contents into it, went into the adjoining room, lay down on a sofa, said good-bye and became unconscious. Louis Daniels, a ten year old son, saw all this, but did not realize what was being done. It was thought from the amount of acid, somewhat diluted, in the bottle, that he took three or four ounces. The bottle had been on the shelf for a long time, having been used as a disinfectant during a long illness of Mr. Daniels. He lived several hours before expiring. Dr. Stark was called but nothing could be done. Mr. Daniels had been in very poor health for several years, and it is said had threatened to end his troubles some time.

The deceased was a pioneer resident. For a good many years he run the old Ashby Pearce property across the river. He leaves a wife, a step-sister of Mr. Robert Snell, one daughter, Sadie, now at Independence with her uncle, Geo. Snell, and a son, Louis.

He was a Maccabee, about 70 years of age.

THE CHRISTOPHONE.

In Church With a Preacher Behind It.

Albany's Christophone has given it a reputation all over the coast. The following is from Friday's Examiner:

"Beginning next Sunday morning Albany people may hear their sermons lying abed, at the breakfast table or in the parlor, if they are connected with the town telephone exchange and don't want to go to church.

"Albany is the first city on the Pacific coast to install this apparatus. It is being placed in the United Presbyterian church by the Home Telephone company, and the Rev. W. P. White, the pastor is preparing one of his finest ones for inauguration of the service."

The Christophone was given the first practical trial Sunday morning. Sixty people were given connection with the Christophone and by actual count over 50 were turned away, such was the interest in the instrument. An able sermon was distinctly heard, as well as the music, though the latter fails to bring out the force of song and oratory yet. Some notes do not harmonize with the instrument, this will be remedied, and two extra instruments installed for assistance. It is a great invention with wonderful possibilities, but there is no danger of its keeping any one away from church who cares for the individuality of the service, for expression and for real worship.
