OBSERVE MEMORIAL DAY

Appeal of Grand Army Post to Cut Out Sports

Sedgwick Post, G. A. R., of this city, in taking the preliminary steps toward the proper observance of Memorial Day, by a unanimous vote, at its regular meeting last night, ordered the following request sent to the faculty and students of Willamette University, the faculty and students of the Salem high school and the Young Men's Christian Association:

In the interest of that which the veterans of the great Civil War deem to be a purely patriotic service, this appeal is made to you, the sons and descendants of patriotic sires, hoping it may bear fruit which will prove as satisfactory to your own sense of appreciation for the services of those who united to suppress the most gigantic rebellion recorded in history, as it will to the surviving veterans of those stirring times.

The 30th day of May was designated by General John A. Logan as Memorial Day, on the 5th day of May, 1868, while he was commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, since which time that day has been observed by the veterans of the Civil War in strewing the graves of deceased soldiers with flowers. It was so observed for many years before the national government made it a holiday. To the veterans it is more than a holiday; it is pre-eminently a holy day, a day which they feel should not be desecrated by sports and pastimes which detract from the solemnity of the service.

With this view of the case may we not confidentially ask that you patriotically refrain from engaging in any games or athletic sports upon that day?

We do not ask that you shall join us in the observance of the day against your will, but we assure you, one and all, that your doing so will be appreciated by the surviving veterans of the war of the rebellion, and you are hereby cordially invited to join us in the short parade through the streets of Salem on that day, and in the observance of our services at the cemetery.

Some time ago a large industrial concern of the east sent a representative to Pittsburgh with the authority to employ one hundred draftsmen and engineers with thorough technical qualifications. The representative was able to secure only forty, and these he had to pay anywhere from fifty to sixty per cent more than they were then earning to induce them to change.

The incident emphasized the great demand there is for technically trained men in every part of the United States. A large proportion of the men at the heads of the various railroad companies are those with engineering educations, and it is stated on good authority that sixty per cent of the officials of the steel industry are technically trained men.

Ask Better Train Service.

Portland, April 17.—Members of the State Railroad Commission yesterday addressed a letter to William McMurray, general passenger agent of the O. R. & N., informing him that the local train service between Biggs and Pendleton is inadequate. In the absence of a necessary local service between these points, the commission argues that the heavy transcontinental trains have been obliged to look after this traffic, with the result that these trains are frequently several hours late in reaching Portland.

The railroad company is requested by the commission to take such steps as are necessary to relieve the situation. For some time, it is learned, the O. R. & N. officials have been considering continuing the Biggs local east to serve the points from which the complaints now come. Since the matter is now formally called to the attention of the company, it is probable an improved service will be provided.

The Tillamook Country.

John Krebs, wife and son came over from Cloverdale, Tillamook county, several days ago, and have been visiting in Independence. Mr. Krebs says his section of the coast is growing, and the advent of a railroad into that country will make many and rapid changes. Work is progressing steadily on the railroad, and the supposition is that it will extend on down the coast to Yaquina.
