TWA DOG SHOWS

April 17.—The Erie dog show opened today, with the longest list of prizes it has ever sent out. There are 212 classes, and there are prizes to each class. The show is held in the Casino rink, a splendid hall for the purpose and the spectators are a fine one, there being some dogs of high degree and very distinguished looking. The attendance is large.

Philadelphia, April 17.—The first show confined entirely to setters in this country, opened today in the Metropolitan hall, where the English setter club is holding forth.

As the American Kennel club rules provide that specialty clubs giving exhibitions confined to a single breed are to rate as four-point shows for championship honors, it is anticipated that the entry will be a large one. The expectation is that the entries will include many of the field trial section of the breed, Mr. Graham, the judge, having by his judging at western shows displayed a tendency to favor a class of dogs which are not fancied so much by the setter judges who usually officiate.

Sheriff Culver Takes Picture of Bunco Man Bell.

Salem special: The accompanying photo is an excellent likeness of William Bell, alias George King, alias William Rich, who is serving an indeterminate sentence of from one to

three years in the penitentiary upon the plea of guilty to the charge of obtaining \$50 from President J. M. Poorman, of the Bank of Woodburn, upon the representation that he had a deposit of \$20,000 in the Bank of Montreal at Victoria, B. C. Bell is wanted for similar fraudulent acts in Portland, where he gave the name of George King, and in Oregon City and Victoria, B. C., where he used the name of William Rich, and is said to have secured an advance of \$50 upon the representation that he had \$25,000 on deposit in the Bank of Los Angeles. He is about 60 years old, and says his home is in Canada, but would not give his home town.

Bell had blank checks of banks all along the coast and charms and pins of high degrees in the Masonic and other secret societies, and even worked his way into the Royal Arch Chapter Lodge of Masons in Woodburn.

The photograph was taken by Sheriff W. J. Culver, who has adopted the policy of photographing all prisoners who come into his keeping charged with criminal offenses. He has accumulated quite a rogues' gallery since his incumbency. He is the first officer of this county to adopt the system, and it has already borne good fruit in securing the identification of criminals.

FATHER OF THE RIVERS

Extent to Which the Greatest American River Is Navigable

Washington, April 17.—It has just dawned on the country that the work cut out for Congressman Burton and his colleagues on the newly appointed inland waterways commission will be enormous. In all the discussion of the navigable waterways of the United States, little has been said or written that would disclose their vast reaches. The inland streams of the United States are in keeping with the wonderful distances of the country. As avenues of transportation they are a marvelous system in themselves.

It is not generally known that the total navigable distance of the Mississippi river extends over a space of 2161 miles for the average steamer, and 2237 miles for smaller craft. Taking into consideration the tributaries of the "Father of Waters," these combined would make a river system 13,160 miles long, through which a good-sized steamer could make its way.

Some idea of the distance these figures convey can be gained only by comparison. It is astonishing to find that it is slightly greater than from New York to Bangkok by way of London. If the steamer were driven by powerful engines, and made a continuous trip, it might complete the journey in about 50 days. However, if it were compelled to make as many stops as fall to the share of the average river steamer, this time would be greatly lengthened.

These figures are for the Mississippi river and its tributaries alone. The splendid reaches of the Columbia river and the mileage of scores of other navigable streams emptying into the Atlantic and Pacific oceans and the Gulf of Mexico, are not taken into consideration. With this mileage added, the navigable rivers of the United States are the wonders of the world.

A faint idea of the immense volume of water that sweeps through the Mississippi valley may be gained from the fact that every second the Mississippi river pours into the Gulf of Mexico 675,000 cubic feet of water. For more than a quarter of a century this great volume of water has served little to advance the cause of commerce. The government, instead of harnessing the great tide and making it bear on its bosom fleets of freight-carrying steamers, has been content to fight its encroachment on farming lands, regarding it rather as a destructive agency than as a great factor in the advancement of the country's prosperity.

With the appointment of the inland waterways commission, and the passage of a big appropriation bill for waterways improvement by the last congress, this policy is about to be changed. The freight congestion that has paralyzed the railroads and has gripped the commerce of the whole United States, has driven the federal government into taking steps for the creation of another means of transportation. This decision was reached only after coal famines caused untold suffering throughout the northwest, and the agricultural state found themselves financially embarrassed in the midst of plenty, because of the inability of the railroads to carry their products to market; while the manufacturing states felt the same embarrassment, because of the impossibility of getting delivery of raw materials.

Large credit is due to the National Rivers and Harbors congress for this belated recognition of the waterways as a means for relieving transportation distress. The organization, which has been at work for five years bringing the matter to the attention of the country, is non-political and lends its powerful influence to no individual scheme for betterment. It stands for a general campaign of waterways improvement, and has contended unhesitatingly that not less than \$50,000,000 a year should be expended by the government in this important work of internal improvement.

ery in the Curtis Lumber company's big mill at Mill City, flew to pieces yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

Driven by the centrifugal force, portions of the large wheel were hurled through the roof of the mill, completely demolishing part of the building.

Two employees, the engineer and the flier, had miraculous escapes from death. They were thrown by the force of the bursting fly wheel, clear through the roof of the mill, alighting on the ground outside. Cal Goddard, the flier, was severely injured but the injuries are not thought to be dangerous. The engineer sustained painful though not dangerous bruises.

According to the statements of those who were near the scene of the accident, the belt on the fly wheel, which is about ten feet in diameter, suddenly snapped, and thus released from control, the big wheel was driven around with terrific velocity, finally flying to pieces. That not more persons were hurt is considered almost miraculous, as many employees were at work near the big wheel when it burst. Chunks of iron and steel were thrown over 200 feet in the air, according to reports of eye witnesses.
