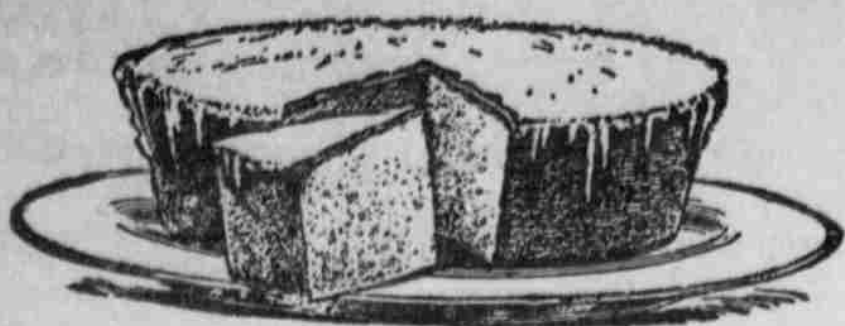

A VERITABLE VETERAN.
Thomas Fannon, Respected Citizen and Old Soldier, Passes Away.

Astorian, April 17th: Though not entirely unexpected, the news of the death of Thomas Fannon at his home, No. 373 Exchange street, at a little past 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon came as a distinct shock to his multitude of friends in this city, where he has been an honored resident for many long years. He died of aneurism of the stomach, and has been very feeble for the past few weeks. His age was 79 years, and history records for him that not many of those years were wasted, but full of virile energy, and largely devoted to the safety and welfare of his country, as he was a soldier in the federal army for nearly half the period allotted to him.

He was a veteran of the Seminole wars and of the civil conflict in the '60s and was an honored member of Cushing Post, G. A. R., of this city, which organization has assumed the honors of burial.

He leaves a venerable widow, two daughters and one son to mourn his demise, besides many a living comrade and friend who has served with, or known him intimately, and to his honor, through his long and useful career.

DEAD IN PORTLAND.
Keeler H. Gabbert of Oregon City Expires on Street.

Keeler H. Gabbert, the well known newspaper man of Oregon City, fell dead on the streets of Portland yesterday morning. He was with the Oregon City Herald and was well known throughout the Willamette valley, having been born in Linn county and been connected with various news dailies for many years.

He went to Portland yesterday morning for a short business trip and when death came to him there was no one with him who could identify him. His body was taken to the

his person with the address of L. S. Rolland, of this city. Mr. Rolland is a brother-in-law of the dead man, and was immediately notified of the sudden death. Mr. Rolland then called up Mrs. Gabbert, who has been visiting in Eugene and informed her of the sad accident. She went to Portland last evening and will make funeral arrangements. Mr. Gabbert formerly was owner of the St. Helens Mist, which paper he sold to Mr. Flagg, formerly of this city. He was a man of about 48 years of age. The funeral services will probably be held in Eugene.

Three Thousand Copies of School Fair Premium Lists Mailed This Week.

Dallas, Or., April 8, '07.
To parents, directors and teachers:
The School Children's Industrial fair of this county will be held at Dallas, September 27 and 28. You will find enclosed a list of the exhibits for which prizes are to be given.

The fair last year was a success in every way, over two-thirds of the schools of the county made exhibits, and over \$800 was distributed throughout the county in prizes.

UREN DENIES COST

Is \$30,000 to \$40,000 for Submitting Legislation to People.

Oregon City special: William S. U'ren, the father of the initiative and referendum, takes issue with the statements that have been published regarding the cost of voting under that law. Mr. U'ren has carefully computed the cost of initiating and referring legislative measures to the people under the act of 1907, which repeals the act of 1903. He admits that the postage expense in sending printed matter all over the state to 100,000 voters will be \$3000, but he says that the cost of printing would be \$3636 for 120 pages of measures, figuring on 100,000 copies, which is one-third more than has ever been printed. He says the binding will cost \$3600 and the paper \$1563.

The experience of Mr. U'ren stands him in good stead in figuring on this matter. He bases the cost of addressing and filling 100,000 envelopes at \$4 per thousand, totaling \$400. The envelopes can be supplied and printed for \$5 per thousand, or \$500, and he believes that the cost of securing the names and postoffice addresses of 100,000 voters will not exceed \$1500. Mr. U'ren's figures summarized are as follows:

Names and postoffice addresses of voters	1,500

The publication by proclamations is not required by the new law of 1907, and the item of \$5000 for that purpose must be eliminated from the cost. Mr. U'ren believes that his estimate is conservative.

New Silverton Buildings.

Silverton special: The Masonic lodge has sold its half of the building to Lewis Johnson & Co., who owned the lower part in which they have conducted a drug store. Messrs. Johnson & Wrightman will move the building to the back end of the lot and erect a large brick building where the old frame building now stands. It is also reported that the Masonic lodge will erect a temple during the summer. A condensed milk factory is strongly talked of for Silverton, and the business men are very enthusiastic over the proposition. While no definite plans have yet been made it is said to be almost a certainty and the work of building will likely be commenced this summer.

Eugene Appendix Club.

Eugene, April 18.—Eugene people who have submitted to an operation for the removal of the vermiform appendix are about to form themselves into a club or society for several reasons. One of the principal ones is that, according to the Darwinian theory of evolution, by intermarriages a progeny may result in several generations which will not be troubled with such a nonsensical trouble-breeder as the vermiform appendix. Judge Wintermeier has thought it all out, and thinks the scheme perfectly feasible and practicable. The only thing in the way is to make all other appendiculated people think so.

BABY CASE UNSETTLED.

Husband Collapses Upon Learning Wife's Deception.

Roseburg Review: Investigation into the case of the newly born child which was deposited last night from the lavatory of a Pullman car onto the S. P. R. R. truck, continued at Myrtle Creek this evening before five of the jury in the inquest held on Saturday, the sixth juror being absent in Portland on business. The investigation directed by District Attorney Brown and the result was a divided verdict of culpable negligence on the part of both the mother and father, while the other two took the view that only the mother was negligent. This disagreement put District Attorney Brown in a dilemma, and day he is holding a conference with Judge J. W. Hamilton as to how to proceed. On the result of that conference rests the disposal of the case.

A pitiful phase of the affair is the mental condition of the husband, who appears to have been grossly deceived by his wife, whom he loved devotedly and trusted implicitly. Merely six months ago, he completely collapsed when informed at Myrtle Creek Monday evening that the child was of full nine months' age and healthy and alive when he, broken hearted, he sobbed the child and at times talked irrationally. Being of a rather effeminate position, it will probably be a long time before he fully recovers himself. He remained in his apartment at the Hotel McCallen all day today.
