Wants to Carve Career in Law.

A special from Salem under date of April 13th, says: "Regret is expressed over the decision of Henry McConnell to resign his position as stenographer to Chief Justice Bean, of the Oregon supreme court. He will enter the active practice of law, and has associated himself with F. M. Saxton, a leading attorney of Baker City. Mr. McConnell is a Portland boy. He was born in 1879, at Coshocton, Ohio. He graduated from the Portland high school in June, 1898, and afterwards spent two years at Leland Stanford University, at Palo Alto, California. He took his law course at the Willamette University law school, from which he graduated in 1904. For the past five years he has been chief stenographer for the supreme court, and during that time was successively private secretary to Chief Justices Frank A. Moore, C. E. Wolverton and R. S. Bean. The firm name will be Saxton & McConnell. The former was at one time the partner of Will R. King, of Ontario, who was recently chosen supreme court commissioner.

Three of the Boys.

Three Salem youth met on a street corner this morning, and it developed that one of the boys, who is 69, has been in Oregon 56 years. His name is Calvert, and he lives on Asylum avenue. The other lads were not much younger. One was a boy by the name of Walker, who is a tenderfoot in Oregon, having been here but 27 years, but he is past 75. WARM BASEBALL PREDICTED

Salem High School Vs. State Agricultural College Called Off

If the present weather conditions continue the game scheduled for the Salem high school with O. A. C. here tomorrow will have to be called off. If such is the case Manager Moores has decided to ask O. A. C. to name next Wednesday for the game.

When the high school and O. A. C. meet in this game there is going to be some hot playing, as O. A. C. does not like the showing they made in Corvallis last Friday, when S. H. S. won from them by a score of 4 to 0. The high school boys won that game by their fast and careful playing, having but one error scored against them throughout the contest, and they expect to put up the same kind of a game, or even better, on their home field. This is going to be one of the big games of the season, and will probably draw a large crowd.

On Saturday, April 27, the high school nine goes to Portland to play the Multnomah club team.

Later—the game at Salem for Friday has been cancelled.

NEW STATE LAWS.

Largest Volume Enacted in Many Years.

The new session laws are now printed and covers 538 pages, as against 455 in 1905. It will be ready for the binder as soon as the index can be completed by Frank Davey, who is working at it.

The laws will probably be ready for distribution early in May, and the journals of the senate and house a short time thereafter.

The past session of the legislature enacted entirely new codes on several important subjects; notably the laws governing assessment and taxation, railroads and transportation and banks and banking. The school laws were extensively amended and rewritten, including long chapters covering union high schools and county high schools, their organization and government. The Port of Columbia bill, and the bill putting in operation for cities and towns the initiative and referendum, are also extensive in their provisions and require elaborate indexing.

The index of the laws of the session of 1905 covered about 50 printed pages, while that of the laws of the last session, as prepared by Mr. Davey, will take up more than double that amount of space, giving an idea of the immense volume of acts adopted by the recent legislature.

The senate journals have been copied, compared and sent to the printer, and the house journals will be finished this week. The senate journal will make the larger book this year, proportionately, as the speaker almost entirely eliminated the roll calls and first and second reading of bills, which reduced the size of the house journal about one-third.

Fair News.

Secretary Welch, of the state fair board, has been notified that the American Hereford Breeders' Association, of Kansas City, will appropriate \$200 for the Hereford exhibits, in addition to the regular classification money.

The Shropshire Sheep Breeders' Association, of Lafayette, Ind., have appropriated \$25 in addition to their first appropriation and Studebaker Company, Northwest, have contributed a fine farm wagon for the best individual farm exhibit, to be raised on farm, in addition to their former offer of \$150 cash.

The old buildings on the fair grounds are being removed and re-modeled, and the cement work for the new buildings and walks began today.

Something Has Happened.

This morning, Thursday, April 18, will go down into history as a record day. The Albany Herald of the same date, and the Eugene Register of the same date arrived on the local train the same morning of their publication. The mail service is awakening, and something has happened that has not happened before in the last 26 years. Those papers arrive from 12 to 24 hours after publication, and the arrival this morning is a freak performance altogether out of keeping with the Oregon mail service between cities of the valley. It is being improved from the appearance of these papers.
