### EDITOR M'MANUS ON TRIAL

Famous Murder Case of Eastern Oregon  
His Wife a Picture of Love and Devotion at His Side  
Pendleton, Or., April 19.—One more juror was selected in the McManus trial this morning before the panel was exhausted, at about 11 o'clock, and the court was adjourned until tomorrow morning, to allow the sheriff to summon a new venire of 27 men. A feature of the morning session was a small sensation created when it was discovered that a juror was about to be accepted as a juror who would not render a verdict of guilty under any circumstances, when the punishment would be hanging. ### IDAHO TIMBER FRAUDS

Suit Against Big Boise Lumbering Concern  
Boise, April 19.—A suit was filed in the United States circuit court yesterday by the government against the Barber Lumber Company to set aside over 200 patents involving 40,000 acres of timber land in Boise county, which cost the Barber people \$100,000. Fraud is the basis of the action. The land and timber involved is over a million. Other lands not yet patented by the company will be held for cancellation of entries. The suit is the result of a year's investigation by government special agents.

### PEACE TALKS PREVAIL

Reception at White House to the Delegates  
New York, April 19.—The Peace Conference will to a great extent migrate to Washington tonight to attend a banquet. The President gives the delegates a reception at the White House Saturday. Peace, law, and the administration side of the San Francisco question may be presented tonight, when Richard Olney discusses the rights of foreigners in states in case of conflict between federal treaties and state laws. Other speakers will be Prof. Willoughby, of Johns Hopkins; Dr. Draper, of Lewis University, Pennsylvania, and Prof. Gregory, of Iowa. This morning Admiral Stockton and C. H. Hyde, of Chicago, and H. P. Wheeler, of New York, followed Root in a discussion of whether immunity of capture during war, and need of offending private property upon the high seas will be in the interest of civilization. Advisability of trade in contraband of war being prohibited was the subject treated by Judge Advocate-General Davis and others.

### RUPTURE BETWEEN MOGULS

And Political Ambition Makes Frick Good  
He Will Part With Harriman to Become Popular With People  
New York, April 19.—There are rumors of a feud between Frick and Harriman on account of Frick's political aspirations. It is reported Frick seeks to succeed Penrose, but cannot get a delegation unless he becomes a staunch supporter of Roosevelt. He cannot pose as Roosevelt's friend and remain in alliance with a man so obnoxious to the President as Harriman. Wall street is watching the rise and fall of Frick's attitude.

History of Case.  
John P. McManus, editor of the Pilot Rock Record, and one of the well-known newspaper men of the state, is on trial for murder in the first degree, for the shooting of Bob Estes, a professional gambler, in a saloon February 9.  
The case will be one of the hardest fought murder trials in the history of the county, and as the result of the entire first day's session only four jurors were selected. It is practically conceded by all interested that the remaining two days of the week will be sufficient to secure the other eight men.  
Twenty-two men were examined Thursday, most of them lived in the vicinity of Pendleton, and were, therefore, familiar with all the facts in the case, and had formed opinions or were biased. There was also an evident desire on the part of some to escape serving on the jury, by the readiness with which they admitted that they could not try the case fairly and impartially.  
District Attorney Phelps is being assisted in the prosecution by Judge Sam White, of Baker City, while McManus is being defended by Judge Fee and Colonel J. H. Raley. The foremen were given a most thorough examination, but not the slightest skilful was given by the questions asked as to what would be the line of defense, and it is still a matter of speculation. The questions asked refer to church and lodge affiliations, gambling and saloon business, and whether married or single. The only bachelor examined was peremptorily challenged.

### OLD EARTH TREMBLES

Charleston Now Gets a Touch of the Quake  
Fears Entertained That a Tidal Wave Will Follow  
Charleston, S. C., April 19.—An earthquake shock was distinctly felt here early today. It was a very perceptible wave motion from east to west that was noted. No damage to any extent resulted, but grave fears were raised that there might be succeeding and greater shocks. Fear of a tidal wave following is also general. The shock was most distinctively felt at Somerville, a health resort 20 miles from here, which seemed to be the center of the seismic agitation.
