FAVORS WORLD PEACE

But Does Not Believe It Is Right at Our Doors

New York, April 19.—Commercial America takes no stock in the prophecies of the immediate disarmament of the nations. This was made clear to the enthusiastic peace advocates crowding the National Arbitration and Peace congress at the Hotel Astor today. James W. Van Cleave, of St. Louis, sole representative of the manufacturing interests of the country at the congress, predicted failure for America's forthcoming demand at the Hague peace conference for a limitation of the armament of the nations.

"No man in this great assemblage would rejoice more sincerely than I," said Mr. Van Cleave, "at the establishment of universal and eternal peace, but I am compelled by circumstances to say that the United States can not safely lose sight of Cromwell's injunction to keep our powder dry. Great Britain, Spain and the United States are to propose in the Hague peace conference in June a limitation of the armaments of the nations. Russia, Germany and Austria will oppose this proposition. This means that many years must pass before the nations disband their armies and navies or place any restrictions upon their expansion.

"As practical men we must pay a decent regard to the conditions which confront us. Therefore I say that Tennyson's 'parliament of man and federation of the world' will not come in the lifetime of anybody in this hall. I wish it were here in 1907. I wish, even, that we were assured of getting it in 1917 or 1927, but it is impossible.

"American manufacturers, as humanitarians and as business men, favor a world peace. Unhappily, however, George Washington's declarations that to be prepared for war is the best way of preserving peace is as applicable to America today as to the America to which it was addressed.

Speaking for the commercial interests Mr. Van Cleave not only foredoomed the American peace conference demand to defeat, but indirectly suggested the likelihood of future warfare for the United States.

"This country must be friendly to all peoples," said Mr. Van Cleave. "It must meet its obligations as a member of the family of nations. When disagreements arise, then, if they do arise, we shall have so ordered our conduct as to appeal to the world's sense of fairness and justice. We shall be able to submit our case to any impartial tribunal with the faith that our position will command the world's approval.

"But suppose that, even with right on our side, justice is denied us. What then? Then we must accept Davy Crockett's doctrine. Being sure that we are right, we must go ahead. There are issues of honor, of principle and of national safety which can not be submitted to any international tribunal."

Mr. Van Cleave spoke, he said, in the interest of the manufacturers whose monetary interest in an international peace is represented by a capitalization of \$14,000,000,000, with products worth \$16,000,000,000 and with 35,000,000 workers, who will be paid \$4,000,000,000 during the current year. He urged that this interest, producing annually manufactures worth as much as all the property in Spain, should have a voice in the formulation of any international peace plan.

"We Americans can not work effectively for harmony between the nations," Mr. Van Cleave said, "until we get peace at home. We must have industrial peace. Harmony between employers in all callings and between employers and workers is one thing we must bring about. We must have peace between the great political parties by abolishing the demagogue in each of them and by keeping the demagogue abolished. Then when we speak in behalf of peace we will be speaking with the voice of 55,000,000 people and in behalf of a country which has as much wealth as any two nations in the world combined.

"American manufacturers want an arbitration board to settle international disputes. This arbitration, however, must be based on justice to all. We want a tribunal in which all the leading nations will be represented to peaceably consider issues in dispute between nations. We want that court to be backed by the sentiment of the world and, if need be,

the armies and navies of the great nations. That kind of court will make settlements which will stay settled. It will command the world's respect."

Mr. Van Cleave spoke strongly in favor of the Monroe doctrine. He held that policy to be one which the United States can never safely submit to arbitration by the Hague conference or any other conciliatory body. He declared it a principle which has done more to promote world peace than any other one thing and gave it as his opinion that had not it been enforced the United States would either have been forced out of existence or would occupy a small place among the nations.

MRS. JAMES AGAIN IN TOWNS OF THE LAW

Woman Accused of Theft of John Tunnel's \$240 Check Arrested Once More and Will Be Given Another Examination Before Justice of the Peace Bryson in Eugene.

Eugene Guard, April 18: An information was filed today against Mrs. Annie James, charging her with larceny, in that she is alleged to have been connected with the theft of the \$240 check from John Tunnel, the Creswell miller. She was arrested once before on the same charge, but upon examination before Justice of the Peace Bryson was discharged from custody, as the evidence introduced did not seem strong enough to warrant holding her for trial in the circuit court. Additional evidence against the woman has since been found and she will be tried on the charge. Bert Kelsay, the young man who gave himself up to the sheriff Monday, is charged with the same crime. The case has already attracted a good deal of attention and promises to attract much more before it is completed. A large number of witnesses have been subpoenaed to appear at the examination of Kelsay next Monday and at the trial of Mrs. James.

Mrs. James was taken into custody at Springfield this forenoon by Constable Plank of this city and brought to Eugene. She at once employed Lee M. Travis to defend her and appeared before Justice of
