LOST IN WOODS.

Philip Standley Disappears on Eve

of His Wedding.

(Roseburg Review.)

A very strange case of mysterious

disappearance was reported here

from Camas valley Tuesday evening.

The missing man being Philip Stand-

ley, aged about 37 years, and a

brother of John Standley, a pioneer

resident of this place.

Mr. Standley was in Roseburg last

Thursday and procured a marriage

license, his bride-to-be being Miss

Anna Bushnell, daughter of Mr. and

Mrs. Henry Bushnell, of Ten Mile

Creek. The wedding was to have taken place

Tuesday afternoon at the Bush-

nell home. On Monday Mr. Stand-

ley started on horseback from his home

in Camas valley, going over the old

road toward Mr. Bushnell's. That

evening about 7 o'clock, his horse

returned home alone with the reins

carefully tried up on the saddle.

This immediately aroused the fear

that all was not right and Perry

Standley and a neighbor, Mr. Smith

went over to Mr. Bushnell's that

night, finding that his brother had

failed to reach there. A general

search was instituted for the missing

man next morning and has since been

continued without definite results.

The searchers found that the miss-

ing man had gone the usual route

over the mountain to where what is

known as the Salt Springs trail

branches off. Near here the tracks showed where the horse had turned back on his return home. Here also was found the missing man's handkerchief. Footprints showed that he had followed the trail leading down the Rice branch of Olalla creek, but where he left this trail or what became of him remains a mystery. It is possible that he lost his way in the darkness, and the search is being continued in the hope of yet finding him alive, that region being mountainous and covered with timber, where anyone not a thorough woodsman might easily go astray.

Another interesting feature of the case is that while in town last week, Mr. Standley executed and filed a deed of his property, consisting of 60 acres of land in Camas valley, to his fiancée. This land had been deeded to him by his uncle on condition of his caring for the latter during his declining years.

On Sunday Mr. Standley addressed a letter to Miss Bushnell through the Olalla postoffice, and this letter was sent to the Bushnell home on Tuesday, but nothing whatever has as yet reached this city as to the nature of its contents, or whether it would show any bearing upon his disappearance the day after it was written. As to whether he was suffering from any aberration of mind has been the occasion of local comment, an older brother having suicided last August during a period of despondency. Nothing unusual was noticed in his demeanor during the last few days, however, during which he mingled with his friends and neighbors as usual. This leaves the case one of deep mystery, and in the meantime the search for him is being vigorously prosecuted.

The estate of the late R. P. Boise, deceased, was valued at \$77,500.

# THE VETO POWER DOES NOT APPLY TO INITIATIVE

Governor or Mayor Cannot Defeat Measures Proposed and Adopted by the People

But the People Have the Power to Veto Any Measure Enacted by Their Representatives

The governor has no power to veto measures initiated and adopted by the people.

That is the substance of an opinion rendered by Attorney-General Crawford in reply to inquiry of District Attorney McCourt, of Pendleton. It is inferred that a mayor would have no power to veto an ordinance or charter amendment initiated and adopted by the people of a city.

Mr. Crawford's Opinion.

"In accordance with yours of recent date, enclosing letter from John McCourt, of Pendleton, Oregon relative to the powers of cities to amend their own charters, and requesting opinion of this office upon the subject of said letter, I have examined the questions referred to in said letter, and I believe the counsel has not thoroughly examined the case of Kadderly vs. Portland, 44 Oregon, 118, for he states that said case holds that the governor has the power to veto initiative measures as distinguished from measures upon which the referendum has been exercised, etc. I find on referring to said case, subdivision 9 of the opinion of the court, page 146, that Judge Bean holds that the veto power of the governor is not abridged in any way, except AS TO SUCH LAWS AS THE LEGISLATURE MAY REFER TO THE PEOPLE.

"Section 15 of Article V, of the constitution provides that every bill which shall have passed the legislative assembly and before it becomes a law shall be presented to the governor. I find no other section of the constitution PROVIDING THAT ANY BILL WHATEVER SHALL BE PRESENTED TO THE GOVERNOR. It is only those which passed the legislative assembly. Therefore, laws enacted by the initiative method do

not go to the governor, and he can never exercise his veto power on them. Judge Bean held further in said case above mentioned that the governor could exercise the veto power on all measures, except those which were referred by the legislature to the people, that is upon all measures passed by the legislative assembly, and those are the only ones which go to the governor at all. The reason he cannot exercise the veto power upon those referred to the people is by virtue of the provision of section 1 of Article IV, of the constitution as amended June 2, 1902, which provides: 'THE VETO POWER OF THE GOVERNOR SHALL NOT EXTEND TO MEASURES REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE.' And the said case of Kadderly vs. Portland construes that provision as applying and excepting from the veto power those measures which are enacted by the legislative assembly, and at the same time referred to the people for a popular vote to determine whether they should or should not become laws. THE VETO POWER IN SUCH CASES CANNOT BE EXERCISED BY THE GOVERNOR, BUT THE PEOPLE THEMSELVES EXERCISE IT AT THE NEXT REGULAR ELECTION OR AT ANY ELECTION CALLED FOR THE PURPOSE OF VOTING UPON THAT MEASURE."
