Albany special: Sheriff Smith today served upon E. E. Parrish a summons and complaint brought by L. C. Parrish, his wife, presenting another chapter in their troubles. The complaint alleges that the defendant is owner of property valued at \$12,000, from which he has not come of \$1600 a year, and asks for \$100 a month from the income.

In connection with the suit a restraining order, signed by Judge Fred C. Sears, of Portland, was today with the county recorder, ordering that the defendant be enjoined from selling or mortgaging two pieces of property of 42.71 acres and 151.42 acres, valued at \$12,000. It is signed by Judge Alfred F. Sears, Jr., of Portland, Emmons & Emmons attorneys. After being served on the defendant it was filed with the recorder.

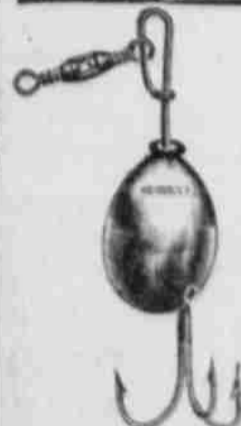

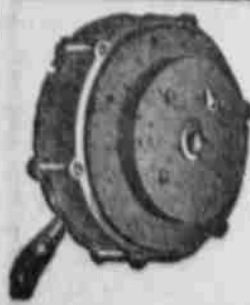
