## "A Yankee Tourist."

One of the prettiest and most interesting comic operas ever written will be seen here on Thursday, April 25, when Raymond Hitchcock, that long popular comedian, will be seen at the Grand opera house in Henry W. Savage's newest musical success, "A Yankee Tourist." If this clever comedian was given a piece of mediocre standard he could provide an evening's keen enjoyment, but "A Yankee Tourist" was written especially for his peculiarly droll style by Richard Harding Davis, well known as an author and war correspondent of much fame, and it is said that Mr. Hitchcock was never cast more strikingly during his stage career. Wallace Irwin, prominent principally because of his verse published in Collier's and other magazines, has provided the lyrics for this tuneful production and lyrics of compelling character they are, too. The music comes from the talented Alfred G. Robyn, best remembered, perhaps, for his score of "The Yankee Consul" in which Mr. Hitchcock gained

success of a decided and lasting nature. Critics have said that Mr. Robyn's latest effort is even more praiseworthy than his triumphs of former seasons and the characteristic style of his music in "A Yankee Tourist" seems to have found popular approval at a bound. There are some score of more of musical numbers, all of which are characterized by a marked strain of originality, not always present in musical offerings of today. Mr. Savage has selected a cast for the support of Mr. Hitchcock which is unusual in its strength, including as it does such players as Flora Zabelle, Helen Hale, Susie Forrester Cawthorne, Eva Fallon, Walter Lawrence, Herbert Cawthorne, Phillips Smalley, Percy Parsons, E. R. Phillips, Herman Ruepke, M. Hale and others well known in the realm of comic opera. The piece has been mounted with the elaborateness characteristic of Savage productions, the chorus is pretty and the whole opera will prove one of the most satisfactory seen here for a long time. 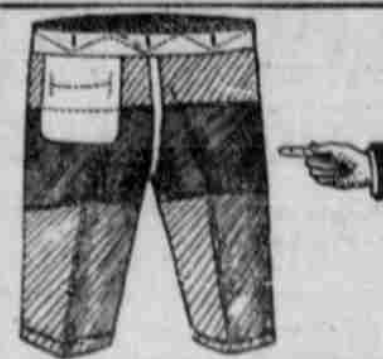

## GREW FIRST OREGON HOPS.

Oscar H. Cone, Pioneer of 1847, Dies on His Butteville Farm.

Oscar H. Cone, an Oregon pioneer of 1847, died at his home near Butteville, Thursday, April 18, aged 76 years. On last Thanksgiving he broke the bones of his hip through a fall, and, though he recovered from that, his general health has been failing since.

Oscar H. Cone was born in Indiana in 1821, and with his parents removed to Oregon, settling in Marion county in 1847. He was among those who were in the California rush of 1848. June 19, 1853, he was married to Margaret J. Strong, and the pioneer couple then settled on a farm in Marion county, though for the next 12 years he spent much of his time in mining and lumbering in British Columbia, and Idaho. In 1867 he purchased his farm in Yamhill county, and had resided there since that time. Mr. Cone was the first farmer to engage in the general growing of hops in the Butteville section, now one of the largest hop growing sections of Oregon, and was still engaged in that vocation at the time of his death.

One of the events of his life in which he took great pleasure was the celebration of the couple's golden wedding, in 1903, at their country home. About 200 persons, mainly pioneers and relatives were present, the banquet being presided over by Hon. F. X. Matthieu, of Butteville.

To Mr. and Mrs. Oscar H. Cone were born three children, all of whom are living: George W. Cone, Newberg, Or.; Mrs. Josie Eberhard, McMinville, Or.; and Arthur A. Cone, Newberg, Or.
