CORRECT VIEWS GIVEN

Let the Truth Be Known About Clackamas Grangers

It has been published over and over that Clackamas county granges are for the University appropriation of \$250,000 biennially. A correspondent of the Oregon City Star, from Logan, where the meeting was held, writes:

What Was Done at Logan.

If you will allow me space, I think that I can prove the correctness of my statement in regard to the "sentiment" of the grange here at Logan April 10th. I said your correspondent or informant was badly mistaken, and I meant it. Being a member, and being present, I heard what was said. Again I say it is unfair to say the sentiment of the grange was nearly unanimous, when only three people out of a crowd of 125 or 130 people got up and expressed themselves in favor of the appropriations. Two of these men were Professor Campbell and W. S. U'Ren. I cannot understand why Mr. U'Ren would say it was "nearly unanimous." The present master of the grange and the past master both share my view, and say it is incorrect to quote the grange in that way. I never have misrepresented any facts, and always, in reporting from here, try to state facts and truth as well. Every one who attended the meeting knows that statement was erroneous. That resolution spoken of was tabled.

The old motto: "God helps those who help themselves," has perhaps sunk deeper into some people's craniums than others, and farmers are beginning to realize some of the educational needs of their sons and daughters. The country school is good as far as it goes, but ends at the eighth grade. Now, suppose children get through these grades at 15 years, they cannot go and enter a high school or college without taking a preparatory course or complete the other courses, and the proper place to do that is in the home schools. Home is the place for boys and girls to board and attend school at that susceptible age, and not be sent away somewhere to do it. The grange is an educator itself, and stands first, last and always for the cause of education.

There are so many numerous little strings, known as red tape, however, that can be dispensed with. If

farmers have to bear their burden of taxation, let some of it be for schools that will benefit their own children nearer home. We can dispense with a few normals, and add a few more grades to the schools we have, and try to make them better. Too much is said of the "higher" education, and not enough for the intermediate for the masses. Better to give all a chance for an ordinary education than only a few for the highest. No ill feeling has been heard expressed toward the State University, and no action whatever was taken at the Pomona meeting. Petitions, however, are now being circulated, which will show the people's sentiment on these questions.

MORE DOGS DIE.

Enemy of Canines Still at Work—Several Dogs Poisoned.

The hater of dogs is still continuing his work, in throwing out poisoned meat, and is getting so bold as to go from yard to yard, distributing his bait, which means torture and death to the unfortunate animals. There were four or five cases of dog poisoning reported last Thursday and Friday. Several of these were of fine dogs. Yesterday there were several more cases reported, among which was the poisoning of John Moyer's trained bird dog, and the spaniel of Mr. Anderson, who resides on North Front street.

Mr. Moyer succeeded in saving his dog, but the latter case proved fatal.

Small pieces of poisoned beefsteak were thrown in several yards on Front street early Sunday morning by the designing culprit, and if the identity of the guilty party is found out he will probably be made to pay dearly for his work.

There is a serious war on at Salem between dog owners and non-dog owners. A severe city ordinance against dogs is pending at present, allowing every citizen to shoot a trespassing dog upon sight. The non-dog owners say the dogs destroy their flower beds and lawns, etc.

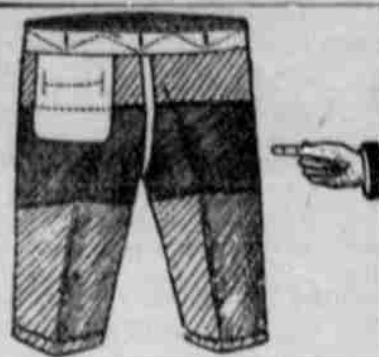
