Hammerstein Goes to Europe.

New York, April 23.—Abraham Hammerstein, the Polish basso, who has been in the French opera house, is the latest engagement announced by Oscar Hammerstein's company, which is to present French opera unique next year at the Manhattan opera house. Hammerstein sailed for Europe today. He said:

"I shall bring over the scene paintings of the Opera Comique in Paris, and they will work all summer duplicating the Paris settings of 'Louise,' 'Milk and Honey,' and 'Manen,' and shall engage other French singers and there and probably a French stage manager and a French conductor. No expense will be spared to make the comique season a success. I shall give 'Louise' at least three times, and I am sure it will be a great success."

It is said that the publisher of 'Louise' refused to sell the American rights unless at least ten performances were guaranteed, and that he demanded \$400 a performance. Hammerstein has announced

that all his subscribers had reserved their seats for next season.

Encampment of the Grand Army. Dallas, Tex., April 23.—The annual state encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, and the Woman's Relief Corps, convened in this city, and will continue its meeting until and including tomorrow. The annual camp fire will be held tonight on the fair grounds. Distinguished speakers are here from the entire bounds of old Texas, and besides, numbers from other states. Excursion rates on the railroads enabled thousands to come who otherwise could not have come, and the attendance is therefore remarkably large.
