FOLLOW MRS. EDDY'S LEAD.

Eminent Men Enlist in Organizing Peace Society.

New York, April 25.—With Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy as its American founder, and Andrew Carnegie, Seth Low, Nicholas Murray Butler and other American publicists identified with the movement, the American branch of the Association for International Conciliation was organized today. Offices for the American department of the association have been opened at 542 Fifth avenue, and from there a Pan-American peace propaganda will be circulated. With international peace as its object, the association aims to secure workers in every national hall of legislation in the cause of peace.

The suggestion that Mrs. Eddy become the founder of the American branch was made after a meeting held in the First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston, last week.

Brisk Bidding for Subways.

New York, April 25.—It is said at the office of the Rapid Transit commission that not only would there be plenty of competition for the subway loop connections for the terminals of the three Manhattan bridges, but for the new subway routes, bids for which are to be received today. Indications are that there will be at least five or six bids for the construction work of the subways alone. These may be awarded separately from the operating contracts if the authorities are so inclined. On the other hand, both contracts may be awarded to the same bidder. In any event there is no fear that the new subways will not be operated if built and the prospects of better transit facilities are, in the estimation of the officials concerned, growing brighter every day.

Webster-Gray.

Boston, April 25.—Today Representative Walter A. Webster was married to Miss Mabel Florence Gray. The bride was for many years a public stenographer, and did much work for many lawyers. Among these was Webster, who became smitten with her pleasant ways, and soon proposed. He told a friend that she could take him without a mistake, but the smile of the reporter made him say quickly that it was his dictation that she took so accurately. The wedding took place at the house of the bride at Atlantic, and the ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. Miller, pastor of the Methodist church. The happy couple started today on a wedding trip to Germany.

Mitchell Is Better.

Chicago, April 25.—John Mitchell is better today, and his condition is not regarded as alarming. He had a fairly restful night.

Asks Receiver for Loan Company.

Camden, N. J., April 25.—Twenty-seven thousand shareholders of the State Mutual Building & Loan association of New Jersey, perhaps the largest institution of the kind in this state, will vote today on the proposition to have a receiver appointed, in order to dissolve the business association and liquidate the business. The main office is in this city, and most of the share holders live here, though there are hundreds scattered throughout the state. Mr. Backer, who made the petition to the vice chancellor to appoint the receiver, said that the withdrawals filed every day with the department of banking at Trenton, were \$400 in excess of the receipts for the same period, and that claims are constantly piling up showing the necessity for a receiver. The association was organized in 1892, and for three years was very successful, its great assets at one time being \$2,500,000 with a total of 77,000 shares outstanding.

Moyer-Haywood Trial Makes Business.

Boise will soon be the most important telegraph station in the West, says the Boise Statesman. There is probably no other town in the whole west that could handle 185,000 words of press dispatches a day, as can be done through the Boise office when the Moyer-Haywood-Pettibone trials begin. Arrangements are being made for handling the big trials. Manager Hackett received word yesterday from headquarters that Chief Operator O'Brien was to be sent here from Seattle with a corps of eight expert code operators, and that they would stay through the trials. Two quadruplex tables are to be installed, and connections are to be made with Nampa over special leased wires belonging to the telephone company. These will be connected with the main line telegraph wires, one going east and one west from Nampa, which will carry the messages to the outside world. They will also lease one railroad wire, after the rush of the railroad business during the day, getting the use of the wire about 9 or 10 o'clock.

TREES WILL BE LEFT

Arrangements Are Made by Which Willamette's Maples Will Not Be Disturbed

President Coleman, of Willamette University, announced in chapel this morning that, after a survey and conference with the city authorities yesterday afternoon, it was found that nearly all the trees could remain along the cement walk, which will soon be constructed on the north side of the University campus. He said in no place was it necessary to go more than 18 inches below the present grade, and, while a few of the trees probably would be removed, there would be plenty of shade left. The new grade, which was agreed upon, will fix the sidewalk six inches lower than the contour line of the property, and at the higher places of the present grade the walk will not be sunk over 18 inches. The work is progressing nicely. The old walk has been torn up, and a portion of it was burned last night on the campus. The bonfire caused many to believe that a building was burning.
