Indians Live on Wild Duck Eggs.

The Merrill, Klamath county, Record says: "A great hullabaloo is raised here every year over the killing of ducks and other wild fowl for market, and Game Warden Hutchinson is having a launch built with a view of patrolling the lakes this season, and putting a stop to this. Those interested in the protection of these birds would do a vast amount of good if they didn't invariably get the cart before the horse. They, however, protect the water fowl in the fall only against shooting, when now is the time of year the game warden should be most active. More is done to deplete the water fowl during the laying season than at any other time of the year. Indians are to blame mostly for this wanton destruction. While it is yet a little early for them to begin to assemble, not a season passes but what from 10 to 40 Indian families are gathered around the borders of Tule Lake, who virtually live on wild duck eggs. In fact it is stated by men on the ground in past years that these Indians have been known to haul wagon loads of duck eggs to the reservation, where they are peddled out among the tribe. Therefore, if game warden

Hutchinson wants to do the cause he represents most good he would do well to visit Tule Lake this spring during the duck-laying season."

Longest Steel Bridge.

The big railroad bridge across the Columbia river which the Portland and Seattle Railroad company is building at Vancouver will be a mile and a half long—the longest steel bridge in the world. Work was begun in January, 1906, and it is expected that the mammoth structure will be completed early in 1908.

The bridge is located a short distance from the main part of the city, though the abutments and the approach are within the city limits. It is on the site where the Union Pacific started to build a bridge 14 years ago. In fact, the second pier from the Washington side—the one on which the draw bridge will rest—was built by the Union Pacific. It extends over a small island on the Oregon side and across a slough beyond there are 48 piers, ten in the river and the rest on the island and in the slough. Those in the river are sunk 40 feet below the bottom and are built on solid concrete from the bottom up to within about 40 feet from the top. The upper portion is constructed of solid granite blocks.
