THE PROGRESS OF CALIFORNIA.

The year just past has been a most eventful one for California, and in the face of the greatest disaster the world has ever known, there has been a progress throughout the state that might be classed as phenomenal.

According to advices received by the California Promotion committee from all parts of California, IT HAS BEEN A YEAR OF ADVANCEMENT SURPASSING ANY PREVIOUS YEAR.

While millions of dollars were lost in the disaster which came to San Francisco and other cities, and an almost unprecedented flood swept over the great interior valley, the state's population has materially increased and development of agricultural lands has proceeded at an unprecedented rate.

Last year's fruit crop of all kinds was one of the largest known in years, and the outlook for the coming season indicates that with two exceptions similar conditions will prevail.

While thousands of settlers of all classes have been pouring into the state THE EXTRAORDINARY DEMAND FOR LABOR IS STILL UNSATISFIED, and immediate employment for both men and women, could be given ten of thousands in all lines.

There has been a lack of accommodation in residences in San Francisco but this condition is being rapidly overcome by the erection of hundreds of new residences.

INDICATIONS POINT TO A REDUCTION OF RENTS.

In San Francisco reconstruction work has been going on at a marvelous rate.

IT IS ESTIMATED THAT 50,000 MEN ARE ENGAGED IN THE BUILDING TRADES; seventeen thousand teams are hauling building material; thousands of other men are engaged in other reconstruction work.

In all forms of rehabilitation during the past year, outside of replenishment of commercial stocks and private homes, it is estimated that \$80,000,000 has been expended, and of this \$20,000,000 was paid to labor.

In the cities about the bay and in Los Angeles and many other interior cities there has been a great amount of building.

PROGRESS WITH SALEM STREETS.

That Salem streets are actually ordered paved is a fact, that is creditable to the mayor and city council.

THAT STREETS ARE BEING SPRINKLED AND THE DUST LAID in the business parts is another step to be thankful for.

This sprinkling should be continued as far as the Southern Pacific depot, AND THE DEPOT GROUNDS SHOULD BE IRRIGATED.

To allow them to dry up and look like a sun-browned desert is not creditable to the city or the railroad corporation.

The impression that thousands of people get who arrive and depart AND WHO ONLY PASS THROUGH THE CITY ARE LASTING.

Another step would be for the street department to stop littering the streets with slabwood, as has been done for years.

The loose rock and rubbish should be raked off the principal streets, if that IS NOT TOO GREAT A STRETCH OF ENTERPRISE.

These steps are all in the line of a greater and better city and to which even public officials should accustom their minds to turn with commendable alacrity.

INFORMATION FOR THOSE GOING ABROAD.

Most appropriate to the season of transatlantic travel the fourth edition of Presbrey's Guide, aptly called "The Handbook of the Ocean." 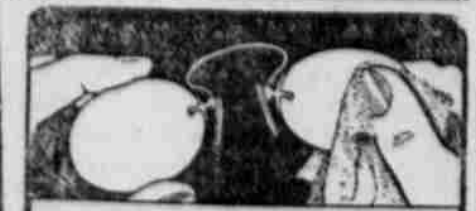
