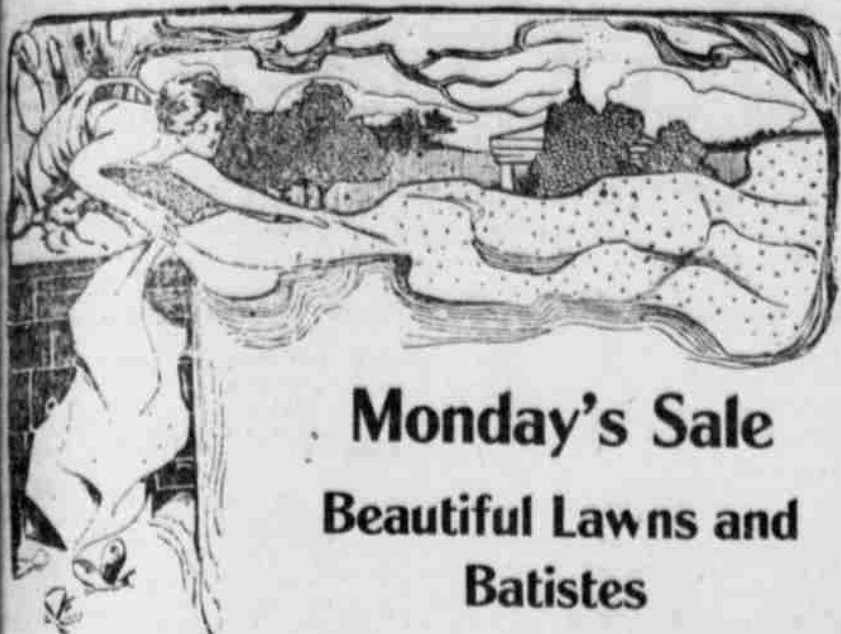

RECALLS FAMOUS MURDER

John P. Dunning, well known
throughout the country as a news-
paper man, died in a hospital at
Philadelphia this week of tumor of
the brain. He was 44 years old. He
was the man who wrote a graphic
description of the Samoan hurricane
which in 1889 destroyed six war-
ships and 15 merchant vessels, and
was with Roosevelt's rough riders in
Cuba.

John P. Dunning was the cause of
the death of two women, his wife
and her sister, who were murdered
by Mrs. Cordelia Botkin, the mistress
of Dunning. The woman, deserted
by her lover, with the cunning of a
fiend, planned the murder of Dun-
ning's wife, and evidently cared not
how many others died with her.

Mrs. Botkin was living in San
Francisco at the time, and Mrs. Dun-
ning was residing at Dover, Dela-
ware, with her parents and her little
child. On one Sunday afternoon a
box of chocolates were received ad-
dressed to Mrs. Dunning, having
been sent through the postoffice. No
attention was paid to the postmark
at the time, and the family and some
of the guests were soon munching
the toothsome paste.

Shortly after everybody was taken
sick, but the illness was not attrib-
uted to the candy. Doctors were
sent for and pronounced the malady
ptomaine poisoning. Everyone re-
covered but Mrs. Dunning and her
younger sister, who after several
days of agony passed away. The
doctors then discovered that the
women were the victims of arsenical
poisoning.

The box of candy was traced to
San Francisco, and finally to Mrs.
Botkin as the sender. The late Cap-
tain Lees did some excellent detec-
tive work on the case, and finally
convicted the murderess. The trial
developed that Dunning was a de-
generate; and that he had been liv-
ing with Mrs. Botkin, and off her.
There were stories of nights of re-
vels and days at the races and drunk-
en orgies at all times in the rooms
of Mrs. Botkin.

The woman was a wife and mother
at the time, but seemed to be un-
mindful of the existence of husband
and son. She was a coarse and vul-
gar person in appearance, and what
attraction she found in the sight of
Dunning other than he had some
money, was not developed during the
trial. Dunning had been separated
from his wife on account of his dis-
olute habits, but the unfortunate
woman agreed to take him back on
his promise to reform.

It was in revenge of his desertion
that Mrs. Botkin murdered the in-
nocent wife and her sister. The trial
of the woman lasted months and was
conducted at an immense expense to
the city, but it wound up in her con-
viction for murder in the first de-
gree.

This was six years ago, and the
murderess is still in jail at San Fran-
cisco, awaiting the decision of the
supreme court on her plea for a new
trial. The case against her was most
complete, the great detective, Lees,
weaving as fine a net about her as
ever guffit was enmeshed in.
