THE STUENENBERG TRIALS

(Continued from page one.)

For several months following the murder, the Stuenenberg case was an item of mere local significance. Up to the arrest of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone the attention of the entire state was attracted to Idaho. The trial and labor element rose up in protest and protested vituperatively against what they claimed was a conspiracy to hang three innocent men. The governors of Colorado and Idaho were charged openly with employing the Pinkertons to carry out a plot, than which none in the history of crime was more inhuman. Frank J. Smith, before whom the case first appeared was called in question and the integrity of the Idaho courts seriously questioned. To these assertions the state paid heed, and continued to gather strength with the hope of strengthening its case.

To date the case has cost the state more than \$100,000. This has been expended to compensate the attorneys, Clarence Darrow, Chicago; E. F. Richardson, of Denver; Fred Miller, of Spokane, and F. Nugent, and to maintain a large staff of detectives and others, who have been at work taking affidavits in support of a motion for a change of venue. Fifty-six thousand dollars have been spent by Idaho upon the request of Governor Frank R. Gooding, the ninth session of the legislature appropriated an additional \$50,000 for the prosecution. James H. Hawley and United States Senator W. E. Borah counsel for the state.

Fifteen months have transpired since the arrest of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone. The defense has constantly urged an immediate trial, but it has resisted to numerous measures which have impeded progress and made impossible the ending of its plea. In March of this year it asked for a dismissal, but was denied. Its motion for a change of venue was granted conditionally, only Ada county being offered in lieu of Canyon. It accepted this alternative, and the case was moved to Alta county. It will be held at Boise before Judge Fremont Wood, who set May 9 for the trial. The defendants will appear separately.

The crime in which Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone are said to have been implicated occurred at Caldwell, Idaho, December 30, 1905. In the execution and it can only be described as brutal, hideous, appalling. Stuenenberg was pursuing his home at dusk. Light snow was falling. A stiff breeze blew the wet snow into his face. He pulled his well down over the eyes, gave his rifle an extra twist, turned up his broad collar, bent into the breeze, and hastened his steps toward home, a devoted wife, rollicking children and a warm fire awaited him. It was but a few days after Christmas—the millennium as it were—when the knowledge of man was complete and man had forgotten his ability to man. From all windows were shown the flickering light of candles—the laughter of children—laughter heard, and here and there faint faces gazed out upon the pedestrian. Stuenenberg, who was a splendid physical specimen,

tail and strong, somewhat of an athlete, covered the mile between the town and his home in a quarter of an hour. Just as the cloak of night fell softly over the quieted community, he reached a little by-path—his favorite walk—which led to the back gate of his yard.

Through the windows of his home he could see his wife and children grouped about the table—set for the evening meal—and awaiting his coming. In the kitchen a servant was bent over the stove. Arriving at the gate he opened it and entered. Being a man who kept things in an orderly way, he grasped the gate and drew it closed.

All Caldwell and the contiguous country heard the terrific roar which followed. Momentarily the people were puzzled as to the cause of the explosion. There was no gas works, no powder works. Perhaps it was the boiler of the electric plant or a freight engine. They rushed toward whence the sound issued. Along the way their ranks were swelled with excited, pale-faced beings. Hurrying further, their steps were directed toward the Stuenenberg place by some who resided near, and had located the sound. Finally they reached the spot. There lay what once had been a man—a gory mass of shrunken flesh and bone. It was the body of the ill-fated former chief executive. The face was unharmed but the limbs were torn and bleeding, the bones pulverized. A wood splinter—a foot and a half long—was blown into one of the arms. The trunk was pierced with countless bits of metal. The great mentality had succumbed. There remained only the brain of an imbecile. With his vitality slowly oozing out, Stuenenberg muttered incoherently. Finally life gushed out of the maimed frame with a convulsive throb. Whatever the motive, the deed was done—Frank Stuenenberg lay dead, the victim of a cowardly assassin.

Fleet, as though winged, the dreadful news traveled. A special train from Boise brought the governor and friends of the murdered man. Groups little and great gathered to discuss the crime.

"Who did it?" asked everyone. Suspicion attached to one, Thomas Hogan, whose singular conduct during the week had made him the subject of much comment. He was a stranger. Now he had posed as an insurance agent, now as an itinerant seeking opportunity for investment.

Hogan was arrested by a posse led by Governor Gooding and thrust into the Caldwell jail.

Then it was remembered that Stuenenberg, because of the rigid authority he had exercised over the offenders in the Coeur d'Alene mining troubles in 1899, had received letters threatening his life. Captain W. S. Swain, of the Thiele detective agency, with a score of operatives, was sent to Caldwell by the Mine Owners' association. Swain said unequivocally that Hogan was the right man, and that he had been helped by Jack Simpkins, of the executive committee of the Western Federation of Miners. Swain's work was impeded by a great many amateur detectives, who had been attracted to Caldwell by the glitter of \$20,000, which had been offered as rewards. These were finally withdrawn. Swain obtained a partial confession from Hogan, who admitted that his real name was Harry Orchard.

Fred Miller, of Spokane, who had figured as an attorney in the Coeur d'Alene troubles, came to Caldwell

to defend Orchard. This, together with the fact that Miller had communicated with Orchard before the latter had divulged his real name, tended to support the theory of Swain.

The Thiele men were suddenly taken on the case and the Pinkertons placed in charge. Following an uneventful month came the startling statement that Orchard had made a full confession, and then followed immediately the dumbfounding news of the arrest of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone on evidence furnished by Orchard.

Subsequent disclosures pointed out that Jack Simpkins, who had been suspected at the very outset, was implicated in the murder. Thus ended the first chapter in this which will prove one of the greatest in the annals of crime.

The Drink Trade of Italy.

During the year 1906 Italian wine exported to England further diminished, the shipments having dropped from 255,725 gallons in 1905 to 243,244 gallons in 1906. Ten years ago such exportations amounted to 500,000 gallons, and it appears in a communication from the Italian chamber of commerce in London that the fault lies with the shippers, who attempt to send wine which is rough and uneven in quality, immature in age and unsuited to the critical English taste. It is reported to the Milan trade that consumption of Italian wines in England is now confined largely to the Italian colonies there and that most of the stock exported from the local vineyards is diluted before being served to the English trade. The consulate has several times noted similar complaints in various foreign wine fields against the Italian shippers, and again offers the suggestion for the consideration of the California and New York vintners. It appears from an inquiry made by the consulate that while the export of Italian wines to England has diminished, that of French wines has increased, especially in the case of clarets, of which, in 1906, 150,000 gallons were imported more than the total entered in 1905. (The total imports into the United Kingdom in 1906 for home consumption amounted to 12,328,691 gallons, an increase of 381,458 gallons over the previous year.—B. of M.)

The Italian commission appointed to study the problem of abandoned agricultural districts in Italy has reported in favor of allowing free importations of American vines into such districts for a period of seven years.

There has been organized in Milan a popular league against alcoholism, which has for its object "the combating of alcoholism and the prevention of its evil consequences." This is the first temperance effort in a country where, comparatively speaking, intoxication from hard liquors is nearly unknown, but into which the use of absinthe and vermouth mixtures is making rapid headway. The league intends to devote itself to disseminating among the lower classes information as to the simple rules of hygiene, together with rules for physical development, healthful recreation, etc., and will undertake to influence legislation to these ends. Membership in the league is secured by the payment of 5 cents per year and assisting in the circulation of its principles. It is supported by the most serious thinkers and social scientists in Milan.—Consular Report.

Fish That Took in Any Old Thing That Came Its Way.

"A shark which appeared to be blest with an uncommonly powerful and indiscriminating appetite was stranded on the deck of the Norwegian fruit steamer Bodo in a storm south of Cape Hatteras. When the Bodo got to port yesterday Captain Larsen told the story, which is substantiated by the tail of the shark and a photograph taken by the captain's wife."

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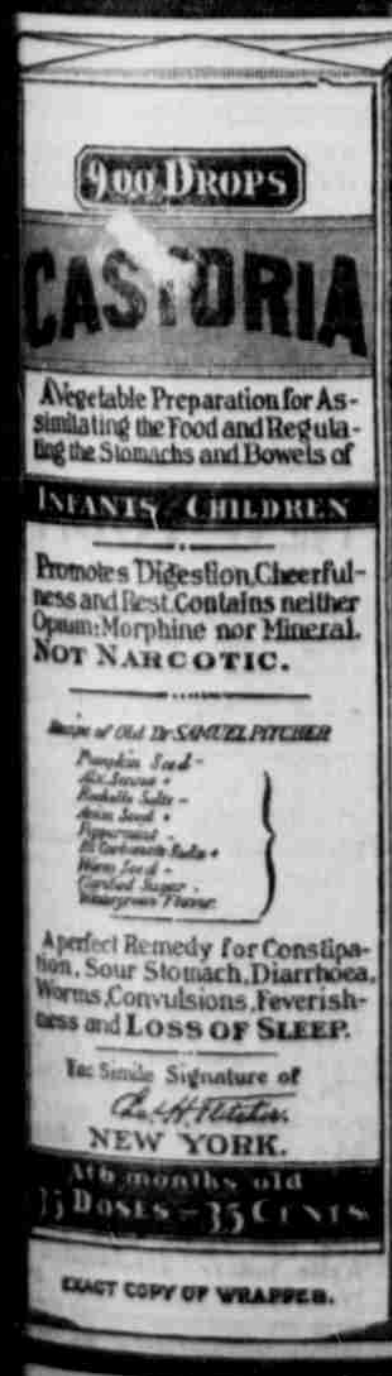
