PETITIONS ROLLING IN VERY FAST

People's Fight to Refer Half a Million of Excessive Appropriations

Jacob Voorhees, of Woodburn, has been designated to receive the petitions of the State Grange against the official pass bill. They are coming in fast, but there is still need of several thousand names.

George Pearce, of Salem, is receiving the petitions of the Linn county council to refer the \$125,000 annual tax for the State University. They are coming in thick and fast, but several thousand names are still required.

Blanks for all these referendum petitions, with full instructions, can be had at The Capital Journal office. Also free notarial attestation. (Albany Herald.)

According to C. H. Walker, the referendum movement against the University of Oregon appropriation is progressing most satisfactorily, and those members of the Linn county Grange in charge are confident of securing the required number of names to the petition by the time necessary.

In Grant county, where, a short time ago, County School Superintendent McIntosh issued a statement that the public sentiment was against the move to refer the University appropriation, Mr. Walker says over 75 signatures to the petition were secured in an hour's time. All the principal business men of Canyon City signed the petition, and it was found that the sentiment was in reality with the Linn County Grange.

During Eugene Palmer's trip through Eastern Oregon, he secured over 1000 names to the petition and there are now persons working with other petitions throughout all the different towns in the eastern portion of the state. Word was received yesterday from Clackamas county that many signatures were being secured, and more copies of the petition were asked for to enable the persons circulating the petition to secure additional names. According to the Linn County Grangers, the petitions will be signed by more than enough to get the appropriations bill referred to the people. (Albany Democrat.)

Eugene Palmer returned this noon from Eastern Oregon, and reports general encouragement in securing names for the reference of the U. of O. appropriation bill, and he thinks there is no question but what there will be plenty of names on the petition. He declared that the reports of the Oregonian of his meeting with discouragement are absolutely false. At a big meeting in East Portland over three-fourths present voted in favor of the referendum, and yet the Oregonian reported that the people at the meeting didn't want the referendum.
