DEWEY CELEBRATES THE DAY

Washington, May 1.—Nine years this morning Dewey sailed into Manila bay, and stayed there, after short excitement "for breakfast." Dewey and his friends banded in celebration of the victory. Dewey, to whom Dewey said: "You are here when you are ready, Gridley is dead. Three other of his sons are dead. Those officers who are still living will attend the celebration."

STREETCAR STRIKERS CONFERRING

POLICE AND ARMY BUSY ABROAD

The Metal Workers of the Bay Cities Strike for an Eight Hour Day

San Francisco, May 1.—After hearing a proposition to accept a modification of the Oakland scale of ten hours' work at from 31 to 40 cents an hour the streetcar men, at a meeting lasting until 4 o'clock this morning, left the matter in the hands of Rev. Peter Yorke and the executive committee, with instructions to ascertain the best terms the United Railroads would offer. A conference will be held with President Calhoun, of the railroads today. It is believed that a permanent settlement will be effected.

Eight-Hour Day Granted.

Stockton, May 1.—In response to a demand from the unions all local shops employing union men granted an eight-hour day. Several companies maintaining open shops also granted eight hours.

MINERS RESCUED AT LAST

SPECIAL TRAIN TO THE HOSPITAL

Perilous Rescue by Walking Underground a Mile Through Water

Johnstown, Pa., May 1.—At 1:15 o'clock this morning seven of the imprisoned miners were taken from the mine at Foustwell. Ten minutes later they were placed aboard a special train, composed of an engine and box car, and started for a run to the hospital at Windber. The men who started to go a mile through water up to their necks were successful in getting through with liquid supplies and bringing the men out with them. Mike Boyla, a mining contractor, who took charge of the imprisoned party, describing their terror, says it was worse than being entombed alone, and that all the tales of shipwreck and cannibalism to sustain life occurred to them. He said: "None spoke of it, but when the last grunts of our dinner pails were gone, and hunger began, I saw by the furtive glances that the men cast at each other that my companions were all thinking of the same thing."

Harriburg, May 1.—The legislature today took official cognizance of the rescue of the seven miners at Foustwell, and directed a resolution to be recorded in recognition of the rescuers' bravery.

THE WORLD OBSERVES LABOR DAY

WITH 'FRISCO UNITED RAILWAYS

Father Yorke Has Been Called In to Make a Permanent Settlement

San Francisco, May 1.—Between 6000 and 7000 iron workers, blacksmiths, machinists, boiler-makers, iron shipbuilders, moulders, steam fitters, copper-smiths, electricians and others engaged in the metal trades of this city and Oakland and other Bay cities struck this morning for an eight-hour day. Twenty-seven shops are affected.

Police and Army.

Paris, May 1.—A call for a meeting of all the striking tradesmen made Labor Day one of dread. A great crowd began assembling early in the Place Republique. Agitators tried to incite them to riot. The police arrested many here and at other points. Troops are held in readiness at all the barracks.

Socialists to Parade.

Chicago, May 1.—A parade of socialistly inclined labor men and speeches by national officers of the Socialist party marked today's celebration of international Labor Day in this city.

Four Strikes at Sacramento.

Sacramento, May 1.—With the first of May Sacramento faces four serious strikes. This morning 500 laundry workers issued an ultimatum to laundry owners, demanding an 8-hour day. The laundry owners refused and a strike will be called before night. Brewery workers threaten to strike if a demand for an 8-hour day is not acceded to. The retail clerks' union is making demands for an 8-hour day, and a fight is on to enforce the demand. An attempt is being made by union labor leaders to organize all workers in the Southern Pacific car shops here, and a strike is expected to develop before long.

Open Shop Strike.

Los Angeles, May 1.—Over 400 truck drivers struck this morning because the employers announced their intention of maintaining an open shop.

Denver, May 1.—Over 500 members of the mill men's union employed in lumber mills, were locked out today. The men had demanded an eight-hour day and a closed shop.

Laughed So Loud She Was Censured.

New York, May 1.—The federal court today acquitted Athol Reader, of perjury. His wife, Ella Raw's Reader, kissed her husband and laughed so fervently in court that she was censured.

Mrs. Thaw Helps a Church.

New York, May 1.—It is stated that Mrs. William Thaw has given \$50,000 to the new Westminster University, Denver. It is understood she has promised to give an additional \$100,000 if the defense of her son does not make too great a drain on her fortune.

Insurance Funds Again in Court.

New York, May 1.—Manager Scrugham, of the international policy holders' committee, arrested with Charles Stirrup and C. F. Carrington, in connection with the election of trustees of the New York Life, was arraigned this morning and immediately furnished \$2500 bail. The hearing will be held Monday.

American Killed in Paris.

Paris, May 1.—This evening a man was killed by a mob for firing a pistol at a soldier. He was identified as an American named Law.

MAYDAY OBSERVED AT SALEM

MISS PHOEBE OLSEN IS THE QUEEN

Breakfast Served in the Open Air by Beautiful Co-Eds

The students of Willamette University are holding May Day exercises on the campus today. A May breakfast was given this morning beneath the abundant shades after which the gentlemen of the various classes busied themselves in beautifying and improving the campus. Early this afternoon a program and May pole drill was given before a very large and appreciative audience. The exercises were held on the campus, which looked its prettiest to receive its queen.

Miss Phoebe Olsen, of Portland, was crowned May queen, and acted her part with grace and dignity. Her maids were the Misses Schindler, Stephens, McPete, Kuney, Anderson Gittens. Twenty-four girls took part in the drill in winding the May pole. General MacArthur Plans to Retire.

Washington, April 30.—General MacArthur was today relieved of command of the Pacific division and the department of California, and ordered to Milwaukee, for such duties as the department may assign to him hereafter. The first of these duties will be to write up his report of the extended trip through China and India, which he made after the close of his service with the Japanese army during the latter part of the war between Japan and Russia. It is understood that General MacArthur will write a very full report of his observations, and that they will be practically the first of his active service. It has been known for some time that General MacArthur was weary of the duties in command of the Pacific division. He felt that he was in an anomalous position, being in command of a division, although the ranking officer of the army. If he had been selected as chief of staff at the time of the retirement of General Bates, he would have been content to remain on active duty until his retirement for age, June 2, 1909. But there were reasons why it was not felt by the President and Secretary Taft, that the election would be advisable, and since congress had amended the law so that there was nothing for General MacArthur to do but take command of a division, General MacArthur's friends always have contended that he was peculiarly fitted to be chief of staff, and that he had been of the opinion that an injustice was done when he was not chosen for that place. There was talk that it was because of difficulty which he had with Mr. Taft, when he was in command of the Philippine and the secretary and civil governor of the islands. That was not the fact, however, Secretary Taft, recognized clearly the ability of General MacArthur, and had no feeling because of anything that had happened in the Philippines. There were other reasons which have never transpired for not appointing him chief of staff. The order of the day is issued over the signature of Major General J. Franklin Bell, chief of staff, and that fact is an interesting commentary on the often revived and never justified story of friction between General Bell and General Ainsworth, the adjutant general, over the issue of orders by a junior of his superiors. General MacArthur outranks General Bell far more than General Ainsworth does, but he received his orders from General Bell. Of course the order is issued, as are all orders to the army, by order of the secretary of war, and it is so stated in the order itself.

SHEEP AND STOCKMEN AT WAR

A LARGE BAND AT FAIR GROUNDS

Track Men Say They Are a Nuisance and May Use Force

There is liable to be a sheep and horsemen's war at the state fair grounds, and the track men there say they are running over their grounds, sleeping in their stalls, and making a great nuisance of the whole premises, so that ladies cannot walk about the grounds. The horsemen have had a meeting and came down town today to see Governor Chamberlain, who promised to investigate the matter. The horsemen say they pay rent the year round, and have possession, and will not be run out by the sheep. No dynamite has been used and no weapons drawn, but there is blood on the moon.

GIVE NOTICE BY WIRELESS.

Earthquakes Cause Machine to Vibrate Hours Before Shock.

Manila, May 1.—Earthquake experts believe that it is possible to be warned by wireless telegraph eight or 12 hours in advance of the shock. Tests are now in progress at Manila as the result of observations made at the time of the last tremor. At that time vibrations in the wireless were noted eight hours before the earthquake was felt. The phenomenon can be explained on no other hypothesis.

Congress Off for Hawaii.

San Francisco, May 1.—The congressional party that will visit Hawaii on the invitation of the legislature of that territory sailed today on the transport Buford, which will, after landing the party at Hawaii, go on to China with supplies for the famine-stricken of China. The party is in charge of George B. McClellan, on behalf of the delegates from Hawaii, and consists of Senator Samuel H. Piles of Washington, Representatives W. P. Hepburn and wife of Iowa, A. B. Capron and wife of Rhode Island, E. R. Hamilton and wife of Michigan, A. L. Brick and wife of Indiana, J. V. Graft and wife of Illinois, Charles E. Littlefield and wife of Maine, E. F. Acheson and wife of Pennsylvania, J. Warren Keifer of Ohio, R. D. Cole of Ohio, Charles McGarvin of Illinois, W. W. Wilson of Illinois, James H. Davidson of Wisconsin, George L. Lilley and wife of Connecticut, Arthur L. Bates of Pennsylvania, D. S. Alexander and wife of New York, Benjamin F. Howell and wife of New Jersey, John P. Fitzgerald of New York, J. P. NOONDAY FIRE AT CHICAGO

Chicago, May 1.—A fire started at noon at 2:55 Wabash avenue, the second floor of which building is occupied by the Lotus Club, noon day lunch club for women exclusively. Two girls jumped from the window and were instantly killed. Police say five are dead, and 25 injured. The first floor was occupied by the Storey & Clarke Piano Company. Two women, Catherine O'Rourke, 22, and Rose Willard, 24, employed in the retail district, are known to be fatally injured, and 15 are seriously hurt. The fire started from crossed wires in the basement. The girls fatally hurt jumped during the panic. The injuries of others were caused by crowding for windows when the smoke appeared. Policeman Sullivan was carrying an unconscious girl down a ladder when another girl jumped upon him, and all hit the pavement and were badly hurt.

Mysterious Suit.

New York, May 1.—Wilson Mizner is made defendant in a suit in the supreme court by Mrs. Yerkes Mizner. The papers are sealed. Justice Bischoff appointed Louis Hasbrouck referee to secure evidence. There is much mystery and many rumors as to the purport of the papers.

Gould Defeating English Champions.

London, May 1.—Gould today defeated, at tennis, Pennell in three straight sets, giving him the right to challenge Miles for the world's championship.

After More Railroads.

Washington, May 1.—The government has started an investigation of over 20 railroad and steamboat lines that are accused of discrimination in the shipment and handling of cotton goods for export.
