Thomas Poulsen, of Portland, was chairman of the State Grange legislative committee. He is regarded as a careful man, and competent to tell the truth. Following is his report on the U'Ren bill amending the initiative and referendum law: "H. E. 123, a bill for an act to carry into effect the initiative and referendum provision of the constitution. This bill WAS APPARENTLY, WHEN FIRST INTRODUCED, INTENDED TO INCREASE THE BENEFIT TO THE PEOPLE OF THE initiative and referendum, by providing for a better distribution of all such laws among the people. It was twice referred and amended, and as passed increases the cost of the use of the referendum and initiative to the people so much as to virtually prevent the use of both. * * * Both the initiative and referendum WILL BE ALMOST USELESS TO THE PEOPLE UNTIL THIS LAW CAN BE REPEALED, or so amended as to do away with the excessive cost attached to the use thereof. It is, in my opinion, a deliberate and in this instance successful attempt to deprive the people of their just rights." If this kind of comments on Bro. U'Ren's work keep up, he will have some explaining to do at the Hood River meeting of the State Grange. But he will be there and make it all right, and become chairman of a committee to draft a new bill. He is a smooth talker, don't you forget it.

ROLLING
UP MORE
PETITIONSReferendum Work Pushed in All
Parts of the State

Mr. Patton, of Macleay, was in the city today to file some referendum petitions for the State Grange. He had over 300 names to the petitions, and says, while the Grange is circulating only the free pass and armory petitions, there is more inquiry for the University referendum than for any others.

The Capital Journal is in receipt of many letters from people in all parts of the state supporting its work in demanding the referendum on some of the gigantic grafts lobbied through the legislature. A. D. Leedey, of Canyon City, writes that he secured 40 signatures in one day at John Day, where the county superintendent stated not a man would sign the University referendum. He says: "Every person to whom the petition was presented in John Day signed it, and nearly all expressed a strong desire to vote on the question."

A prominent man from Newberg writes: "I have almost 100 names, and there are others working. The friends of the University ought to be willing to leave it to the majority of the people. If they object it shows to my mind that they think the bill was put through by fraud, and that the people know it. I believe that when any law is passed by the legislature, it ought not to become a law until it is voted on by the people, and placed on the ballot without any further cost."

VALLEY
CITY WILL
OIL STREETS

(Independence West Side.)

A meeting of the business men of the city was held Saturday night to discuss the proposition of oiling the streets for the coming season.

The meeting was well attended, and much interest was manifested in the project. Mayor Paddock presided and the discussion of the subject by those present was all favorable to putting oil on the streets at as early a date as arrangements can be made for so doing. The best method of application was discussed somewhat, but in regard to this the committee having the matter in charge will be governed largely by the experiences of other cities that have used oil.

A committee composed of A. Huston, W. L. Bice and A. Moore was appointed to order a car of oil, and were given authority to proceed with arrangements for collection of funds, and the placing of the oil on the streets. A compensation of \$3 per day for actual time consumed by the committee in doing the work was authorized. The car of oil will be ordered at once, and it will be but a short time until it is applied to the streets.

Mayor Rodgers, of Salem, has undertaken the project of oiling the streets of Salem on his own initiative. He has ordered two cars of oil for the streets, trusting to the progressiveness of the business interests to come through on the propositions. The application of oil was tried on the streets surrounding the court house square last season, and the experiment proved very satisfactory. The oiled street was dustless all summer, and needed no sprinkling, but the sprinkled streets were dusty within an hour after sprinkling with water. The odor of oil was much in evidence the first week or two, but soon became not so offensive.
