MUST RECLAIM ITS LAND

Officers of Company Appear Before Commissioners to Confer Upon Regulations

Under the new management of the Columbia Southern Irrigation Company, of which Walter H. Moor and W. H. Lytle, of Portland, are at the head and principal financiers, appears before the state land board and makes a satisfactory showing of good faith and intentions toward the fulfillment of the contract to reclaim the land within its segregation, within a reasonable time, the action at law for the annulment of the contract between the state and the company, which is being held in abeyance pending the fulfillment of the promises of the new management to make good the deficiencies of the old, will be instituted in court and prosecuted vigorously to relieve the company of its obligation and make room for other capital to complete the project.

The adoption of an order to this effect was the result of a meeting of the state land board Tuesday, after hearing the petition of the Columbia Southern Water Users' Association through Attorney W. E. Guerin, Jr., of Portland, asking that legal action be not delayed, that the company be put out of business, and the project taken in hand and completed by the state. The board does not consider this proposition feasible, but the state has neither funds nor authority to foster the enterprise. It reposes faith in the new organization and is disposed to give it a fair chance to make good its promise.

An order was made requiring the officers of the company to appear before the board next Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, to confer upon the adoption of rules and regulations for the reclamation of the land, subject to the approval of the board. The company will be given 20 or 30 days' time in which to submit complete plans and estimates covering the completion of the project.

In conformity with an order made by the board last June for the benefit of the old management under the presidency of Robert W. Wilson, of Portland, the board also adopted a resolution forbidding the company to furnish water to any lands outside of the segregation, until the reclamation of all the lands within has been completed. It also provides that all of the available supply of water shall be furnished the settlers for the irrigation of such lands as may now or hereafter be under cultivation for crops, without regard to whether or not the interest and principal, or both, upon deferred payments for the purchase of the land upon the lands has been paid.

Guardian Appointed.

A. B. Basey has been appointed guardian of the estate of Elizabeth Herren, incapable of conducting her own affairs. Bonds were placed at \$10,000. Mrs. Herren is 73 years of age and is in an enfeebled condition of mind. Her son, Theodore Herren, has been appointed guardian of her person, with the understanding that he will permit his mother to visit Adelia Moore, her daughter, and that at all proper times her grandchildren be permitted to visit her.

Clara Bauer Reigsecker has been appointed guardian of the estate and person of John W. Baur, a minor. W. J. Jones, Rudolph Schmidt and J. B. Craig have been appointed appraisers. The bonds were fixed at \$1400.

Farmers Institute Up at Stayton.

A. L. Mack and E. Shepherd, Stayton farmers, were in the city today, looking after some of the details of the farmers' institute to be held there May 24, 25, when they will have a big program of general interest.

May Have too Excise Bonds to Pay.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 1.—Local liquor dealers are incensed at the amendments introduced to the state excise laws by Assemblyman Whitney. The principal amendment that arouses their ire is the one that proposes to change the official year from May 1 to April 30, as at present October 1 and September 30. If the bill is passed, the liquor dealers and brewers will be themselves obliged to pay for two excise bonds this year. One will be required to cover the short excise term from May 1 to September 30, and the additional bond will be required for the following year from October 1, 1907, to September 30, 1908. Although the price of excise bonds has been cut down, by the rupture of the combine, from \$40 last year to \$10 this; the necessity for procuring two bonds of \$10 apiece, will nullify part of the advantage of the cut. In the case of saloonkeepers controlled by brewers who entered into an agreement last June to compel their customers to buy bonds of a certain company at \$18 apiece, the extra bond this year will bring the bond cost up to within \$4 of the \$40 extorted by the local bonding trust companies last year. Another feature of the Whitney bill is that it provides for the appointment of 11 instead of six deputy excise commissioners. The additional excise commissioners are to be appointed for the counties of Westchester, Albany, Onondaga, Oneida, Rensselaer and Schenectady.

Start on Balloon Trip.

St. Louis, May 1.—With a sharp wind blowing and heavy clouds banking the sky, Captain Charles DeF. Chandler, United States signal corps and J. C. McCoy, an aeronaut, of New York City, started last night on the long distance balloon trip they have been trying to take for three days. They hoped the wind would carry them eastward, that they might land near Washington, D. C., but immediately upon leaving the ground the balloon took a southerly course, veering slightly to the west.

Captain Chandler is making aerial observations for the government, which is now interesting itself in balloons as to aids to the army in case of war. He carried instruments to show the altitude and the speed attained. Mr. McCoy hopes to win the Lahm cup, offered for the longest distance continued flight.

The balloon left the ground at 7:21 p. m. The weather was not favorable for ballooning, the air being heavy with moisture and the temperature almost to the freezing point, but the flight was made in order to have the benefit of the moonlight, without which the flight would not have been attempted. carrier pigeons were taken and messages will be sent back to St. Louis by the aeronauts. Captain Chandler said before entering the basket that they expected to be in the air about 48 hours. Provisions to last the two men three days were taken.

The start was even, the balloon rising straight in the air until higher than surrounding buildings. It then veered sharply to the south and continued in that direction until lost to sight.

The America, in which Mr. McCoy and Captain Chandler ascended is the second largest balloon in the United States. It has a displacement of 78,000 cubic feet and lifting power of 3500 pounds.
