A FALL DOWN AND RUN OUT.

Herman Wise Throws Glass at Paul Monarch, Who Retaliated by Sitting on Wise's Neck.

Herman Wise, who recently was the janitor and stable man for Eugene Eckerlen and Paul Monarch, of the Eckerlen hotel bar saloon, had a little mix this morning that afforded amusement to the spectators as well as some humiliation for the first named gentleman. Mr. Wise, it is said, came from Independence, and was reckoned in those parts as a first-class scrapper, and that he felt he was confident of his ability in battle was shown this morning when he threw a glass at the Monarch of the bar of Eckerlen's. It seems that Wise has been making some remarks about Paul, and this morning when the former gentleman came in, probably to get his morning beer, the latter gentleman told him that he would "have to cut that style of talk out." One word brought on another until Herman of the family Wise passed a glass at the head of the Monarch, who had called him down. He also made action that might suggest that he had a gun which he wished to show, at least Paul did not take any further chances, but lost no time in getting Wise by the neck who soon curled up on the floor like an apple peel. After sitting on the man who threw the glass and wore the big booth awhile, Paul was given the assurance in guttural tones that Herman would be a good Dutchman, and not get too "wise" any more. Paul was then monarch of all he surveyed and let his victim loose. The German gentleman threatened to swear out a warrant on the charge of assault and battery, but no such document has made its appearance, and it is presumed that he has reconsidered.

A St. Paul Man Dies of Bullet Wound

While riding on a load of hay with his father on a ranch near St. Paul, Or., Monday, Frank Lambert 21 years old, accidentally discharged a rifle that was concealed in the rack and received a wound in the abdomen, from which he died at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon at St. Vincent's hospital, Portland.

The body was shipped to St. Paul for interment.

The victim of the fatal accident was widely known in St. Paul and vicinity, and was popular in the neighborhood.
