TAX TITLE WORTHLESS.

Important Case Decided by Judge Smith of Baker County.

An important decision was made by Judge Smith in the circuit court this morning, says the Baker City Herald of April 30. The case involved was that of Elsie L. Mount vs. Robert McAuley, et al., a controversy that has been going on for years, and has cost the contestants many hundreds of dollars.

Several years ago Robert McAuley and others bought the I. O. Sterns property, consisting of 160 acres, on Sutton creek, a mile north of Norton, and four miles south of Baker City. The land was bought at a tax sale and held for a term by the purchasers. Later the plaintiff offered to buy the property back, according to the law regulating the purchasing of tax titles, and the defendants refused to sell, claiming that the title had passed to them. The decision of the court is for the plaintiff. As a prop osition of law the court decided that the tax title was of no validity, and that the defendant was entitled was entitled to collect the amount of taxes that the pleading showed was due them.
