TOURNAMENT OF SHOTGUN ENTHUSIASTS

Ogden, Utah, May 2.—The Idaho-Utah Sportsmen's association opened its annual meeting today, and will keep it up until and including the 4th. The meet is the most successful ever held in the state or west of Denver. Many prizes have been held up for competition, and the purses and money have been so divided that even the most inexperienced and uncertain participants can carry home some of the money. Since the securing of the tournament for this city several other additional gun clubs have been organized in Ogden, and each and every member of the local are looking ahead toward a very successful tournament. The Ogden Gun Club, on whose ground the tournament is to be held, has purchased a new location and fitted it up both for the tournament and for permanent grounds with all modern improvements, conveniences, and target facilities. J. L. Head, one of the most famous trap shooters in the country and special representative of the U. M. C. Cartridge company, has immediate charge of the local tournament, and will manage all events. Mr. Head enjoys the reputation all over the country as one of the squarest sportsmen living and he will act as referee in all cases that may arise. Six hundred and fifty dollars has been added to the general prize fund by the Ogden club and the donation of several valuable prizes has also been secured. A special feature this year, inaugurated since the last year's tournament at Pocatello, is that \$150 has been set aside from the general fund which is to be increased by a charge of \$1.00 to each amateur who takes part in the tournament. This amount will be divided pro rata among the shooters who shoot through the program in the events of Friday and Saturday, and fail to receive out of the prizes sufficient money to reimburse them for their entrance fees, minus the cost of ammunition and targets. This feature has been added as an inducement to the amateurs who attend and will give them an inspiration to compete. Another feature of the tournament is a series of exhibitions by some of the best trap shooters in the world. All of the large gun, powder and firearms companies have representatives on the ground and most of them will enter the exhibition shooting. Among those who are in this contest are Pat Adams, of the U. M. C. Cartridge company; John Boa, of the Winchester Arms company; Callison, of the Peters Cartridge company; Charles Plank, of the Ballistite Powder company, and P. J. Holohan, of the Dupont company.

OREGON HAS LOTS OF BOOKS BUT NO BIBLE

Superintendent Ackerman Finds He Is Far From Being the Only One Without the Book

There was things doing at the state house yesterday, that stirred up everybody from governor to janitors. It all came about because School Superintendent Ackerman, for some inscrutable purpose known only to himself, wanted a Bible.
