THE THOMPSON MURDER CASE.

The supreme court of Washington has rendered a peculiar decision in the case of Thompson who killed Judge Emory.

In an interview for the Seattle Times, and in answer to the direct question—Judge Snell, of the superior court of Pierce county, declared that the supreme court had given him the privilege of doing one of three things:

(1) Judge Snell may liberate the prisoner altogether, on the ground that he is entirely sane, and there entitled to his freedom.

(2) Judge Snell may turn Thompson over to his friends and relatives under a heavy bond requiring him to keep the peace and behave himself in the future.

(3) Judge Snell may send Thompson to the penitentiary, or to an asylum.

Some speculation has been had as to what Judge Snell will do—but that, of course, is mere speculation, for no one can read Judge Snell's mind—and up to date the judge has given no indication as to what he will do.

Of course, the board of lunacy composed of eminent experts in nervous and brain diseases, would necessarily have great weight with the court—and it is understood that Judge Snell will order such a commission who will examine Thompson and report to the court whether he be sane at the present time.

If this commission should declare that Thompson be sane—and that there is no more danger of a recurrence of his insanity than there is in any ordinary person becoming insane—then as a logical result of the court's action, Thompson's freedom would follow.

The court to be sure, might impose restrictions and conditions, such as requiring a large monetary bond for Thompson to keep the peace—thus apparently throwing around the community a degree of protection.

On the other hand, if the board should find Thompson in the same mental condition in which he was when the experts testified before the jury, then there would be but one course for the court to pursue—and that would be to treat Thompson as an insane person with criminal tendencies, and incarcerate him in the penitentiary.

TRUTH TELLING ENFORCED BY STATUTE.

The most active and undiscriminating press censor in Russia or Turkey might well hesitate before endorsing a plan which a thoughtful California editor, with all apparent gravity, proposes for the regulation of newspapers published under the Stars and Stripes.

To begin with, the far western reformer would have newspapers men licensed, like dogs, peddlers and dog-catchers.

What qualifications would be required of candidates we are not informed.

Neither are we told what penalties would be visited upon the conscienceless wretch who should write political forecasts or reports of ball games without due authority of law.

We are also in the dark as to the punishment that might fall upon any paper employing an unlicensed reporter, or upon any person who should read his stuff, knowing it to be the work of an unlicensed hand.

But these are details and could easily be adjusted if the license principle were once accepted.

Having established the legal status of his editors and reporters, the reformer would hold them to a rigid accountability.

He would forbid the falsification of news, under penalties varying in severity from a brief suspension of the guilty writer to his permanent exclusion from newspaper work.

The project also provides for the suppression of papers convicted of lying in the first degree.

A CONGRESSMAN WHO WAS AS EARNEST AS AN EVANGELIST.

One of the most interesting portraits in the May American Magazine is that of the late Dudley C. Haskell of Kansas, who is an important figure in the present chapter of Ida M. Tarbell's story of the tariff.

Mr. Haskell wears a long coat and a long beard.

He looks somewhat like the late Alexander Dowle.

Of Haskell and his work in congress Miss Tarbell writes:

He was a man only forty years old, a powerful individual, over six feet high, with a voice as big as his body, and with the face and eyes of an evangelist.

His earnestness, for a cause he had espoused, was almost tragic in its intensity and forced him to work and fight for it passionately and untiringly.

Two subjects had occupied him so far in the six years he had been in congress, polgamy and protection.

He hated the first as he revered the second.

Indeed, for Haskell protection was a complete solution of all economic difficulties and he had fanatical devotion to the doctrine.

The only question he asked himself in making a tariff bill was whether an article could or could not be raised in this country.

If it could not, he would put it on the free list.

If it could he would protect it beyond the possibility of foreign competition.

Of course, this reduced his labor to finding out how much each article needed to be put beyond competition. This was a matter of fact.

As soon as he was put on the committee of ways and means, which was at the opening of the 47th congress, he went to work with unparalleled industry to master the conditions of each article.

He became a veritable encyclopedia of information on the "needs" of industries.

When the work on the bill of 1893 began, he redoubled his efforts.

His days he spent in committee and in the house, his nights receiving representatives of all sorts of industries.

The facts and figures they gave him he attached in long festoons to copies of the bills which he was making ready for the debate.

BROKE OPEN AN OLD TIME GRAVE YARD

A discovery of the greatest scientific importance was made near Altoona, Pa., when the perfectly preserved bones of a number of gigantic prehistoric animals were unearthed purely by accident. The discovery was made by blasting in the limestone quarries of the American Lime & Stone company, along the Pennsylvania railroad, just east of Hollidaysburg.

The fossils unearthed are being carefully guarded pending the arrival of an agent from the Carnegie Institution, at Pittsburgh. Superintendent J. King Henry of the quarries has been in telephonic communication with Dr. W. J. Holland, curator of the Institute at Pittsburgh. At present it is believed that when the skeletons discovered are reconstructed they will prove to be as great a find as the famous diploterus unearthed in Wyoming, and now on exhibition at the Carnegie museum.

That the bones which were unearthed are those of animals that existed at least 20,000 years ago is almost certain. The discoveries were made in a limestone formation, 35 feet below the surface of the rock, the formation of which has been estimated by scientists to have taken place 20,000 years ago.

The bones are those of different animals or animals of different ages, from baby creatures to those which had attained their full growth. Three pieces, the thigh, joint ball and socket, were found to be intact after the blast. The thigh is 10 1/2 inches in diameter and the joint ball seven and a half inches in diameter. One tooth, six and a half inches long and three and a half inches wide, is ribbed crosswise with five ribs, having chisel-edges, three-quarters of an inch deep. The teeth have two roots, and the ivory coating was worn away by chewing.
