VEGETABLE SCHOOL LEGISLATION

Superintendent Ackerman Devises Means Whereby School Buildings May Have Better Buildings.

Seeing the necessity of better arranged school houses Superintendent Ackerman has devised a plan where the school districts which build buildings may have the benefit of specifications drawn by competent architects. The state of Georgia has already published a pamphlet of plans for convenient healthful school buildings which is distributed to all the districts of the state.

By permission several of the specifications and plans have been inserted in the Oregon school laws. These give the floor specifications so that those districts in want of buildings may select according to their needs. Then by calling upon the county superintendent they may secure without cost the full plans of buildings and detail specifications. Mr. Ackerman has purchased enough of the pamphlets from the Georgia school department to supply each county superintendent and as every third class district must have approval of the county superintendent before building this plan will doubtless prove a great help to the various communities.

Superintendent Ackerman says in a report: "I regret the necessity, however, of reporting that in many rural communities too many buildings are constructed without any attention being paid to these (heating, lighting, ventilating and best arrangement for the children) important factors." The chief reasons for this says the report is that the school boards do not see the necessity of employing competent architects and builders. This plan saves the state the costs of publishing a book of specifications and at the same time gives to the school districts the same building advantages as are to be had in Georgia.

PRODUCTION AND CONSUMPTION

The Increasing Tendency of the Former to Outstrip the Latter.

A writer in one of the bulletins issued by the department of commerce and labor points out that the United States consumes 95 per cent of the manufactured goods produced within its borders and follows up the statement with the inquiry: "Does any manufacturer anticipate that, with factories, mines and lands increasing in their output at the rate they are in the United States, the quantity sold abroad will continue to be restricted to a 5-per-cent limitation?" It is an interesting question he raises, and one that will not be satisfactorily answered with stock references to the illimitable markets of the world. As a matter of fact, the world's markets are not illimitable, and the evidence is overwhelming that they are not expanding as rapidly as production. England, France and Germany each consume about 80 per cent of the manufactured goods produced by them, and are obliged to find an outlet for 20 per cent of their output. But it is extremely probable that concurrently with the necessity for the manufacturers of the United States finding an increased outlet, the countries mentioned will be confronted by the same need of an enlarged market, for it is not likely to arise until a period of depression occurs which will affect the whole world, and then all the surplus nations will be struggling together for the dwindling opportunities to see their products. It is a serious problem and one that is not likely to be settled by a resort to the plans recommended by some of our consuls, who seem to think that all we need do is to extend our present foreign markets to insure against a rainy day. They quite overlook the fact that when the precipitation begins it is likely to be rainy all over the commercial world and that all hands will be struggling simultaneously to get in out of the wet.—San Francisco Chronicle.

EDITORS WILL PLAY BALL.

Scribes of Portland Will Swing the Willow and Gambol With the Horsehide Sphere.

Baseball that is baseball of the Simon-pure unadulterated variety, bearing a 14-karat, triple-X stamp, says a Portland exchange, is to be furnished the fans of Portland by the pencil pushers of the city. In a series of six games between teams from the editorial staffs of the Journal, Oregonian and Telegram.

SUGAR CONSUMPTION OF DIFFERENT PEOPLES

The number of pounds of sugar consumed per capita for the year between August 31, 1905, and September 1, 1906, is as follows in the Milan market: United States, 92.46; Great Britain, 77.83; Denmark, 71.21; Switzerland, 53.35; Sweden-Norway, 46.97; Germany, 43.40; Holland, 39.16; France, 36.17; Belgium, 33.04; Portugal, 15.69; Spain, 10.27; Greece, 10.07; Turkey, 9.75; Bulgaria, 7.78; Roumania, 7.52; Italy, 7.45; and Serbia, 6.75. Italy's low consumption is interesting from the fact that in that country sugar retails for about 16 cents a pound. Considerable discussion is now on foot with reference to the high taxation on sugar, which, as says a recent writer in one of the foremost Italian reviews, "instead of being, as in other countries a common ingredient of the food of the people, is looked upon as a luxury to be used only on some grand fete day or in sickness."

Though the Brussels convention of 1903 established \$1.20 as the difference which should exist between import duties on sugar and the tax on its manufacture in all sugar-exporting countries, Italy, which is not an exporter, so taxes sugar in both its manufacture and its importation as to create a difference of from \$4 to \$6, according to the quality of the stock. Every quintal (220 pounds) of sugar manufactured in Italy is taxed \$13.40 on its fabrication. Sugar importations are taxed \$19.10 per quintal for first grade stock and \$16.98 for second grade, the total tax on sugar amounting in Italy to about 340 per cent of its true value. Sugar imports into Italy from July 1, 1906, to February 28, 1907, amounted to 7825 tons, an increase over the amount imported during the same period of 1905-06 of 1261 tons.—Consular Report.
