MEET CAR STRIKE IS ON TODAY

Franciscans Smile at Discomforts From Force of Habit

San Francisco, May 6.—Through the deep with dust, San Francisco thousands of tollers walked to work this morning, or rode in consequence of all sorts from automobiles down to rickety express wagons. The situation is accepted in the cheerful manner as marked the day of the fire. There is little complaint on the score of walking, but they grumble because they had to get out of bed an hour earlier than in order to reach their places of employment on time. Throughout the night the strikers picketed the cars, special attention being paid to the Turk street barns, where Jim and Frank Curry, the famous car-breakers are supposed to be based, and from which it is expected the first cars will run tomorrow. The night passed without incident, save an occasional hooting followed the entry into the streets of wagons laden with provisions or bedding.

The present temper of the car men counts for anything there will be little need for calling the militia. Preparations to that end are going forward. President Corcoran of the car men's union, has made promises from known radio that they will do nothing to trouble. Cornelius and his lieutenants were at headquarters early this morning to complete their plans for carrying on the strike. Members of the civic league, who are making attempt to bring the trouble to an end, also put in an early appearance, and are lining up their forces for peace.

KANSAS CITY WILL HAVE A BOAT LINE

Kansas City, May 6.—Kansas City has made a determined move to free itself of railroad discrimination, by organizing a company to put steamships on the Missouri, to run to St. Louis. The railroads take the Mississippi as a basing point for their west-bound, with the result that in many cases, freight charges to the state of Missouri to Kansas City oftentimes are half as great as through charges from the Atlantic coast to the river.

The inequality has long been a source of complaint to the merchants of Kansas City, and has done more to retard the growth of that town. It has been the Kansas City merchants at the heart of their competitors in the great metropolis, and in other ways worked to the town's disadvantage. It is intended to overcome this discrimination by the introduction of water transportation, and it is safe to predict that the railroads across Missouri will take a sharp and swift drop.

Captured in Manila.

CRAWFORD OF NEBRASKA IS NEXT

Washington, May 6.—The case against Governor Crawford, of South Dakota, who is charged with illegally fencing land patents, has been referred to the department of justice. Ballinger, commissioner of the general land office, stated that the bureau had completed the work in his case after cancelling all patents filed by Crawford.

HAS SEVERED DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS

Washington, May 6.—The state department is advised that Mexico has severed all diplomatic relations with Guatemala as a result of Guatemala's refusal to surrender to Mexico General Jose Lima, Calbereas, close personal friend, who is accused of instigating the murder recently in Mexico City, of Barrillas, former president of Guatemala. The American legation in Guatemala City will look after Mexican affairs in Guatemala.

"Black Hands" Convicted.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., May 6.—Eleven of the 13 alleged "Black Hand" members were convicted this morning, and two were acquitted. They were accused of conspiring to extort money from merchants.

STANDARD OIL ASKS FOR A NEW TRIAL

STANDS CONVICTED ON 1492 COUNTS

If Fined the Limit Rockefeller Would Have to Dig Up Almost Thirty Million Dollars to Satisfy the Law

Chicago, May 6.—Government attorneys today are arguing against the appeal of the Standard for a new trial, and asked the court to assess a fine of \$20,000 on each indictment, the conviction having been obtained on 1492 counts for rebating. Should this be done the total would amount to \$29,840,000.

DROP INTERSTATE TRADE.

But Continue to Peddle Dirt to Home Consumers

Chicago, May 6.—Forty-six establishments have been compelled to give up their interstate, but retain their inner state trade on account of the enforcement of the inspection laws within the last ten months, according to A. B. Marvin, chief of the bureau of animal industry, in an address to the meat inspectors this afternoon. He says the companies preferred to lose their interstate trade, rather than take the expense of complying with the laws. He says many plants have been closed for using prohibited preservatives.

Died a Natural Death.

Dover, Del., May 6.—To all practical purposes it was settled yesterday that there never was any crime involved in the pathetic tragedy that brought to a close the life of the four-year-old Horace Marvin, Jr., the lad whose whereabouts has been a theme of almost world-wide anxiety for two months, and whose body was yesterday discovered within half a mile of his father's home.

In order to permit the burial of the child's body a partial inquest and partial autopsy were held today and a simple funeral took place this afternoon, the interment being in the lawn near the house. The body will later be sent to Sioux City, Ia., to be buried beside the grave of the child's mother.

Death from Starvation.

The one definite thing brought out by the investigation was contained in a statement by Dr. J. H. Wilson who performed the autopsy. He stated that the boy had not been drowned, but had died probably from exposure and starvation. In his opinion death occurred not less than four weeks ago and probably not less than six weeks ago. No marks of violence were found on the body; there was no wound of any sort and no bones were broken. Possibly the child had lived for 48 hours after taking food.

FIRST GUN OF HAYWOOD TRIAL FIRED

MOTION FOR BILL OF PARTICULARS

Borah, the Indicted Senator, Appears As the Government Counsel

Boise, May 6.—"You charge this man with a crime which it is impossible he could have committed, and refuse to indicate how he could have done it. The indictment charges the murder of Stuenberg, at Caldwell, Idaho, December 13, 1905, when Haywood was in Colorado. Then the crime is conspiracy, while the indictment charges murder. I appeal to the court to compel the prosecution to show what overt act is alleged before the trial is fixed." Thus forcibly argued E. F. Richardson, of Denver, chief counsel for the defense today, when he read the opening gun of the Moyer-Haywood-Peterson case. The proceedings are purely technical. Selection of the jury will begin Thursday. Today's plea is for a bill of particulars. Judge Wood took the matter under advisement. Arguing against the motion for the bill are Attorneys Hawley and Borah, who, for the state, said the prosecution must not be bound by such a bill.

JOHN WATSON IAN MAC LAREN DIED TODAY

IS TAKEN SUDDENLY ILL ON TRAIN

Death Caused by Blood Poisoning Following An Abscess in Throat

Mount Pleasant, Iowa, May 6.—Dr. John Watson (Ian MacLaren) died here this afternoon of acute tonsillitis. He was taken ill on the train en route from Minneapolis on a lecture tour. He was taken from the train to a hotel in this city. His wife was at his side. The disease became acute and ulcers formed. One broke Saturday, and, being in a hard place to reach, the wound was not subjected to treatment. He died at 11:15 this morning from an abscess which caused blood poisoning.

WILLAMETTE DEFEATS PACIFIC

Owing to a disputed ruling in the 220-yard dash, the athletes of Pacific College, of Newberg, left the field last Saturday afternoon in the Pacific vs. Willamette field meet, thus forfeiting the meet to Willamette. The trouble arose over the decision in giving first place in the 220-yard dash to Cummings, of Willamette. The visitors claimed that Cummings, who was given the first place, fell in front of their representative, Kenworthy, before the line was reached and that Kenworthy really finished first.

The local team claim that Cummings fell after having crossed the line, and that he finished first. This latter was the decision of the judges, and the Pacific College men immediately left the field, and the meet was awarded to Willamette.

The incident is to be regretted, as the contesting schools have hitherto held but pleasant relations with each other.
