ONE TO BE HANGED.

Cannon, Roberts, Miles and Gordon of Malheur, Delivered at the Pen Yesterday.

Henry Cannon, B. R. Miles, Lloyd Roberts and Oliver Gordon, the first three sentenced to the penitentiary from Malheur county, were brought to the city yesterday, and delivered to the state prison authorities. Cannon will serve a five-year sentence for the larceny of five head of horses, while Miles, who was also convicted of horse stealing, was given a three-sentence. Lloyd Roberts was convicted of assault with intent to kill, and will spend one year behind the bars.
